\$100,000,000 SPENT IN STATE BY TOURISTS

The division of state advertising reports that the latest 1939 motor travel survey indicated that about 3,000,000 automobile tourists visited North Carolina in 1,000,000 cars and spent \$100,000,000 in the state.

The World's Fairs at New York and San Francisco accounted for much of the 11 per cent increase in automobile tourist travel in 1939, as compared with 1938, the division said. Tourists going to and from the fairs usually traveled in a hurry and did not spend much time or money in the states through which they passed.
