The foreign office disclosed the foreign minister's plans shortly after the arrival yesterday in Berlin of Per Evind Svinhufvud, 79-year-old former President of Finland, who enlisted German aid for Finland during the World war.

Soon after his arrival by airplane from Copenhagen with two Swedes, the former Finnish President was reported to have gone to the foreign office and the possibility was raised that he might see Adolf Hitler.

German officials said he did not see Von Ribbentrop they acknowledged that Aarne Wuorimaa, Finnish minister to Berlin, was at the foreign office in the afternoon.
