Believe Hitler and Duce Plan 'Safety Ring' Around Reich

(By the Associated Press)

Adolph Hitler, in a two and one half hour conference with Premier Mussolini yesterday was believed by neutral observers to have enlisted the aid of Italy in neutralizing a "safety ring" around the Reich.

Observers believed that if Germany started an offensive against the Maginot line Italy would then consider the question of throwing her military weight in the Nazi scales.

Mussolini's reply to the latter proposal in the conference at Brennen Pass could only be conjectured. The official announcement of the talk emphasized the cordiality of the two leaders. Italian observers expected that Sumner Welles, American ambassador would be advised tomorrow concerning details of the conference.
