### DECLARES DIVIDEND



MacKenzie King's Liberals tonight piled up a strong lead in eastern Canada and accomplished the defeat of the leader of the chief opposition on the basis of initial returns from today's general parliamentary elections. #### FATALITY-FREE YEAR

WASHINGTON, March 26. (AP) — Colonel Charles Lindbergh said today that the completion of a fatalityfree year of operation by United States Airlines "indicates that the day is not far in the future when most first class travel will be by air."

Lindbergh described the safety accomplishment as "one of the most significant advances ever made in commercial aviation," in a letter to Robert H. Hinckley, chairman of the civil aeronautics authority.
