Coalition Ministry Formed in Finland

HELSINKI, March 27.—(AP)-Prime Minister Risto Ryti, who negotiated peace with Moscow, reorganized his government today, forming a cabind officially described as a coalition ministry uniting all parties for the task of reconstruction.

Vaino Tanner, foreign minister in the old government who was the target of bitter personal attacks by the Soviet press and radio, was stepped down to the post of minister of welfare. The new foreign minister is Rolf Johan Witting, 61-year-old veteran of varied political and financial experience, including service in several cabinet posts.

PARSHALL HAS SIX . 2-MINUTE TROTTERS

Addition of Clever Hanover to Noted Trainer's Roster Monday Brings One of Four Horses He Raced to Records Last Season.

With the addition of Clever Hanover's name to the stable roster on Monday of this week, Dr. H. M. Parshall now has six two-minute performers listed in the string of forty-seven trotters and pacers that he is training at the Pinehurst track.

At the close of last season's racing, Dr. Parshall ranked first among the race drivers of all time in the matter of two-minute performers, as the records show that he has driven an even dozen horses in two minutes or better, Vic Fleming of Syracuse, N. Y., standing second with eleven such credits.

Clever Hanover 1:59½, was driven to that mark in a winning race at Syracuse, N. Y., last summer by Dr. Parshall, he being one of four horses that Parshall raced to records of two minutes or better last season. Clever Hanover is owned by Litchfield & Toothaker of Lexalong a likeable four year old trotter called Sandy Man, a son of Guy Day 2:041.

The Mahlon N. Haines stable continues to hold the season's track records, and on Tuesday set a mark of 2:21 for the juvenile trotters to shoot at. This smart mile was done handily by Butch, a son of Protector in 1:591. Trainer Delvin Miller
