Easiest When The Carpet Is Bought First

EDENTON - "What should I choose first - carpet, draperies, furniture or paint or wallpaper?" That question confuses many homemakers as they make plans to decorate a room.

According to Mrs. Mary G. Cowper, home economics extension agent, Chowan County, many women prefer to select the carpet first. It is usually the most expensive item and often has the most limited range of styles and colors.

It is also easier to mix a paint color that will match upholstery and drapery fabrics than it is to find a fabric that will match the paint, Mrs. Cowper observes.

It isn't always possible to select furnishings in this order - carpet, fabrics and wall color - or to redecorate a room completely, Mrs. Cowper concedes. Often a homemaker has to choose furnishings or fabrics that match what she already owns. This happened to Mrs. W. C. Bunch of Edenton. Although she had the draperies, furniture and wall color she wanted, it took her two years to find the "right" carpet.

Five Types Of Vacuum Cleaners Now Available

RALEIGH - A new shop-type vacuum cleaner, designed for heavy duty assignments, such as cleaning garages, patios and fireplaces, is on the market in some areas.

This means today's homemaker has her choice of five types of vacuum cleaners - the upright, canister, lightweight, portable or shop-type, Thelma Hinson, extension home management specialist, North Carolina State University, says.

Shoppers may find 1967 vacuum cleaners offer a dash of color and design. "The trend toward decorative vacuum cleaners is being stepped up, since consumers are asking for brighter colors and upgraded styling," Miss Hinson explained.

To add beauty, one manufacturer has introduced a vacuum cleaner hidden inside a hassock. "Since it is a self-contained unit on casters that can be left in the room when not in use, the hassock-type cleaner eliminates the need for storage space," Miss Hinson notes. "But the weight of the unit limits its mobility, especially up and down stairs," she adds.

Although the hassock - model cleaner was test marketed before, without success, the industry is optimistic about its acceptance this time. They see it as a boon for apartment dwellers or for consumers who need several vacuum cleaners for their homes.

"Two other types of cleaners are still in the experimental stage," Miss Hinson says. One is a canister vacuum cleaner that will float on air for easy maneuverability. The air exhaust is directed under the canister, lifting it just slightly off the floor.

This floating vacuum cleaner has its critics who say "the air exhaust merely blows dust and soil away from the vacuum cleaner."

Battery - operated cordless vacuum cleaners are also in the developmental stage. The amount of energy needed to operate this cleaner limits the length of time it can be used before it needs recharging. According to Miss Hinson, "the industry is working hard to eliminate this problem."
