Jackson Water To Be Cut Off For Flushing July 28-29

JACKSON - Water customers of the town of Jackson are hereby that from notified Saturday, July 28, 12 noon to Sunday, July 29, 12 midnight, water lines of the town of Jackson will be disinfected and flushed. The water distribution system will contain heavy concentrations of chlorine, which will render the water unfit for human consumption and domestic purposes during the treatment period.

Water customers are

advised to store water for drinking and domestic use to last for the period.

The town fire alarm will be sounded at 12 noon Saturday to remind customers that the treatment of the water system has started.

During the treatment period water may be used for flushing toilets only. The water should not be used for drinking, cooking, bathing, washing, or for watering flowers, shrubs or grass. No precautions will be necessary in connection

with home water heaters except to turn off oil, gas or electric switch. Do not leave faucets open.

When the treatment period is over about 12 midnight Sunday or possibly earlier, one long blast of the fire alarm will be sounded. Customers may then open their water faucets briefly until excess chlorine odor has vanished. This work is necessary to

rid the water distribution system of excess rust, iron, discoloration and odor.
