We are informed that a shooting occurred in the Cove section of the county about last Sunday or Monday in which a negro by the name of Shadrack Harris was fatally shot by Henry Cotman, a white man. It seems that the negro, drunk in a crowd, was asked by Cotman if he was not drinking it down, or something to that effect. The negro replied with an oath that he was and stated that it was none of Cotman's business. Where some further remarks not pleasant to all to Cotman, he drew his pistol and fired two shots at the negro, one of which struck him in the thigh, the other in the abdomen. The latest report says that the negro died Tuesday night, and in the morning of the same day Cotman disappeared and has not yet been found.

Death of Mr. Callahan.

Mr. J. Thomas Callahan died at his home near the S. C. & G. E. Station, this morning at the hour of six o'clock, after a long illness. Mr. Callahan was one of the county's best citizens, a generous and upright man, highly respected by all who knew him. He was married about twenty-three years ago to Miss Hattie Justice and she with three children are left to mourn his death. The funeral will take place to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Baptist church of this place, of which deceased has long been a faithful member.
