PRIMARY RESULTS

Morrison and Gardner in Second Primary for Governor July 3rd. Brock and Hammer to Run Again for Congress in Second Primary. Hoke Wins for Associate Justice. Second Race Will be Between Judge Adams and Judge Long. Sheriff McDonald Defeats Carl Shores for Sheriff by 291 Majority. All Five Members of Old Board of County Commissioners Renominated.

A big vote was cast throughout the State in the primary June 5th. The full returns are not yet complete, but it seems probable that Morrison will lead Gardner by a few votes. The latest returns available up to going to press this (Thursday) afternoon give MORRISON 48,030, Gardner 47,476, and Page 30,096. This, of course, is not final and a number of precincts are yet to report over the State. However, it is definitely settled that Morrison and Gardner will contest in a second primary for Governor July 3rd. And the Morrison forces are expecting the majority of the Page vote will come their way.

In the fight for Congress from this seventh district, Hammer, of Randolph, led, but lacked about 2424 votes of getting a majority. Hammer secured approximately 7143 votes, Walter E. Brock, of Anson, came next with 5246, and John Vann, of Union, third with 4310. A second primary will be held July 3rd for Hammer and Brock. If Brock and Hammer each get their same vote in the second primary, Brock would then have to get but 66 2/3 per cent of the Vann vote in order to win. And that Brock will do this his friends are confident. In fact, John Vann on Wednesday of this week came to Wadesboro and voluntarily pledged his loyal support to Brock. And this is the spirit that will actuate the big bulk of those who voted for Vann; they will come to Brock, of our neighboring county of Anson, instead of going to Hammer, of Randolph. The Post-Dispatch hopes that Richmond county will rally solidly behind Brock in this next primary.

It seems certain that Judge W. A. Hoke has won for Associate Justice, but a second race will be held for Judge Adams and Judge Long. And here again it is hoped the Richmond county

will favor a neighbor—Judge Adams, of Moore. In the contest in Richmond county, Sheriff McDonald was renominated for Sheriff by a majority of 291 over Carl C. Shores. The entire old Board of Commissioners were easily renominated. But it is better for the paper to give a more connected account of the primary; so here goes:

Despite the almost continuous rainfall last Saturday, the primary vote in Richmond county was the largest ever cast—a total of 1833 voting for Sheriff and 1813 for Governor.

Across the top of this page can be seen the complete vote for the various candidates for each precinct. The POST-DISPATCH has been put to a considerable amount of time and effort to compile and prepare this tabulated form, but the result is well worth the work in the appreciation of our readers.
