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## PRIMARY RESULTS

Brock Wins for Judge in Richmond County by 362 Majority, But Stack Wins in District by 286. Johnson Wins for Register of Deeds, and Hatch and White for County Commissioners. Don Phillips Has Big Lead for Solicitor. Uncertainty About Second Primary for Solicitor Between Phillips and Russell. Second Primary to Be Held July 1st for Senate, Clerk and Sheriff, and to Select Three More Commissioners. 4055 Votes Cast in Richmond County, 643 More Than Election Two Years Ago. Sheriff and Clerk Candidates for the Primary Sign Expenditure Pledge. Second Primary Ticket on Page Four. File Adjoining Tabulated Vote for Reference.

The foregoing tells tersely the result of the Democratic primary held last Saturday, June 3rd, 1922. It shows that while W. E. Brock for Judge carried Richmond county by 362 majority, and carried five of the six counties of the district, still the big majority Mr. A. M. Stack received in Union county was enough to overbalance the Brock majorities and cause Mr. Stack to win by 286.

Don Phillips made a fine run for Solicitor and it is likely that he will be the nominee. He received about 7900 votes, to about 4200 for Russell, 3700 for Nash and 1400 for Tarlton. Mr. G. H. Russell has the privilege of asking for a second primary, but up to the time of going to press the Post-Dispatch has been unable to learn whether or not he will run again. He made a strong fight, and is a good man, but the huge majority of Mr. Phillips will probably preclude his attempting a second primary. In Richmond county Phillips received 1832, to 1356 for Nash, 613 for Russell and 117 for Tarlton. In Scotland county Phillips had a lead over Rus-
