GRIST WINS OVER SHIPMAN IN PRIMARY JULY 5TH BY 523 IN RICHMOND COUNTY AND OVER 30,000 IN STATE. A LIGHT VOTE POLLED.

Frank D. Grist will be the next Commissioner of Labor & Printing for the State. This was settled last Saturday when in the second primary he decisively defeated M. L. Shipman, who has held the office for 16 years, by a majority well over 30,000.

The majority undoubtedly would have been much larger had there been second primaries in all the counties. The votes shows the people are behind a world-war candidate, provided he is worthy and well qualified; and also shows that the personnel of Shipman's office is not pleasing to the voters of the State.
