es Rockingham Friday, and a meeting of the guarantors is called for Saturday morning at the Rockingham Hotel lobby at 10 o'clock to organize and set in motion the machinery for the sale of Season Tickets.

The POST-DISPATCH last week published the names of the 52 guarantors, but is republishing the list now. The paper also published a synopsis of the various attractions, but is publishing this again too.

Synopsis of Attractions:

The sparkling comedy, "Applesauce"; premier musical companies including the internationally popular Solis' Marimba Band and Ruthven McDonald and his Highlanders; lectures by such headliners as Private Peat and R. B. Ambrose—these are among the many first rank attractions which will appear here at the big 1926 Redpath Chautauqua which opens Thursday, May 20th, and continues for five days.

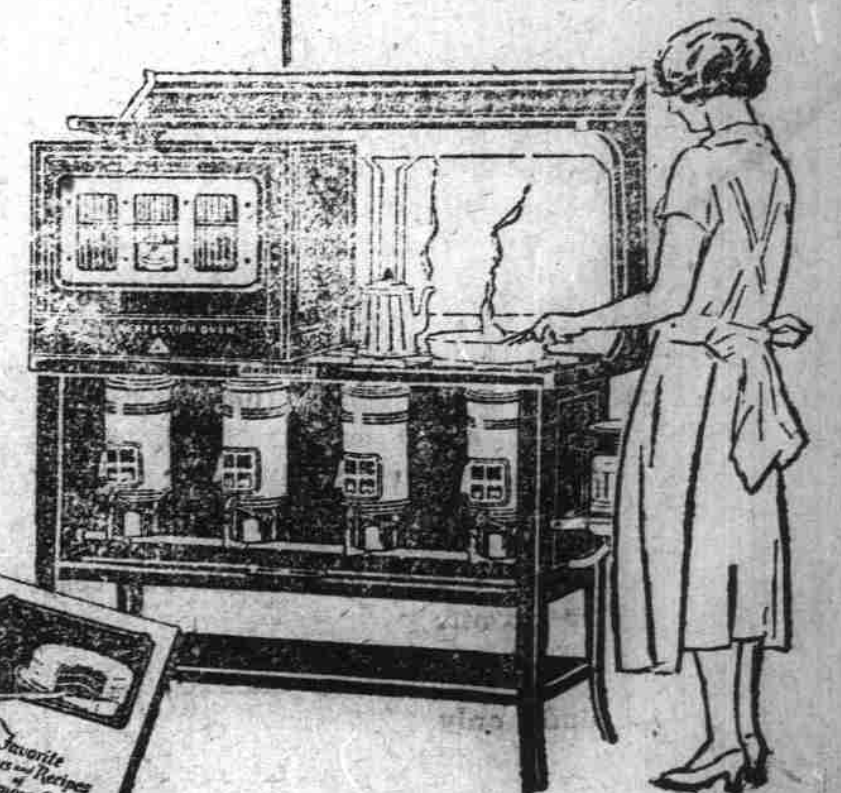
