4-H Clubs Now in Camp Indian Lodge

A New Group There Each Week. Richmond Group Aug. 22nd.

Some months ago the Federal government turned over to our State Conservation department the Indian Lodge camp, 15 miles northeast of Rockingham. And the Conservation department has turned it for the summer months to the State College Extension department, under L. R. Harrell, for the use of the 4-H club boys and girls of the state.

Each county or group of counties is allotted the camp for a week. Charlie Stott, who graduated from State College in June, is the director at the camp and in charge of the activities. Until Sept. 1st the camp is closed to all outside parties, swimming, etc. and is reserved entirely for the 4-H groups.

Last week the camp was occupied by the 4-H clubs of Granville and Person counties.

Beginning July 4th the Moore and Montgomery county groups are in camp there. Then on July 11th the Wake county group come. July 18th week is open. July 25th the boy scouts of Albemarle have it. Aug. 15th the Greene county group comes and then on Aug. 22nd the Richmond county clubs will camp for the week.

The camp can take care of 75 boys and girls—and it affords an ideal recreation site, with swimming, boating, fishing and all outdoors facilities.

On July 1st the Juniors journeyed to Wilmington and beat the seaport boys 5-0. Taylor was back in the game after an arm trouble of some weeks, and pitched five innings, giving 1 hit. Preston Oliver pitched the remaining four innings and gave only 4 hits. Wilmington failed to score.
