of the deferred matters at issue. The Board delegated Member Carl McLean to make the rounds of the county and collect the ballot boxes and place them in the office of the Clerk of Court.

Close Votes

Majorities in County Were Quite Close in Most Instances.

Never has there been such a close contest in any Congressional district in this state. There are 12 counties in this 8th district, and Deane carried eight by a majority of 7,211, while Burgin carried the four northern counties by majority of 7,285. This gave Burgin a majority for the entire district of 74, from unofficial returns.

Burgin has asked for a recount in Richmond county, which is granted. Deane has asked for a recount of all the boxes in Davidson county, but the Davidson Board refused. It is understood Deane has appealed to the State Board. Deane also demanded a recount of certain Union county boxes, alleging that ballots put in the wrong box were not counted. The Union Board refused, and this also has been appealed to the State Board. Deane also demanded a recheck of certain absentees in Montgomery county, and this will be heard by the Montgomery Board at Troy Friday night, at an adjourned meeting.

In Richmond county there were 7121 votes cast, of which 460 were Absentees. They do not vote Absentees in Union or Anson. There are no figures available as to how many were cast in Davidson. The Absentee tabulations are on page six.

The County Race

The full tabulated unofficial vote for each candidate by precincts is on page three of this issue.

It shows that Deane secured a majority of 3759 in this county, with Deane getting 5440 and Burgin 1681.

The State Senate race was close. According to the figures as tabulated by the Board, but not formally declared, Harrison received 3457 and Jewell 3441—or a major-

ity of 16 for Harrison.

For the House, Bob McNair's figures show 3515, to 3481 for Thomas Leath—or a McNair majority of 34.

For the office of Sheriff E. B. Morse gets 3476 to W. E. McNair's 3346—or a Morse majority of 419.

J. W. Hamer secured a majority of 816 over L. F. McCaskill for County Commissioner — 3720 to 2904.

For County Recorder, H. F. Brown received 2924 to 2623 for W. H. Covington—a Brown majority of 301.

The County Solicitor race was very close. Thomas Parsons defeated Solicitor Ammie Webb by 105—the Parsons vote being 2812 to 2707 for Webb.

The closest race was that for Constable for Rockingham township. Ruben Pierce got a majority of 2—his vote being 1158 to 1156 for Diggs. And Diggs has asked for a recount of the two Rockingham township boxes.

For Constable of Wolf Pit township, Mack Wallace secured a commanding lead of 570 majority over Clifford Dutton. The vote was Wallace 1394, Dutton 824.

Much could be written about the vote in the various precincts, but the tabulated "score" shows it, as at present tabulated, and you can check it over and make your own comparisons.
