Deane asked the Union county Board to recount certain boxes in Monroe wherein Congressional ballots were discarded because found in the county box. The Union Board refused a recount, until compelled to by the State Board. This recount was made July 16th and resulted in a net gain there of 48 for Deane. In Montgomery county a recheck of Absentees on July 18th netted Deane 10 more votes; and in the examination of Absentees by Atty. L. P. McLendon at Lexington last week, 22 of Burgin Absentees were thrown out as being clearly illegal. And so these made a net gain of 80 for Deane. However, he lost 79 in Richmond county by the recount, and so this left him one vote gainer - thereby reducing the Burgin original majority down from 74 to 73.

However, some 40 Absentees in Montgomery county are still in dispute, and affidavits have

been filed with the State Board which if allowed would throw out 40 more Burgin votes.
