#### New 1939 Plymouth On Display Here

Local Plymouth Dealers Present Public Showing of Earliest New Car Line. At Culberson Motor Company.

A new Plymouth of brilliant design—with new ride engineering, new high-torque engine performance and a score of new luxury features for the lowest price field—makes its bow here Sept. 16th as the earliest line of 1939 model cars go on public display at 11,000 Plymouth dealers' showrooms throughout the country. Culberson Motor Company, here at Rockingham, received one of the new Plymouth coupes today, and it is on display in their show rooms. The new cars are from \$5 to \$15 cheaper than last year. The new Plymouths shown here confirm forecasts from the industry that stronger "eye appeal" would be a feature of automobile designs for 1939.

They are said to be the biggest Plymouths ever built with a longer wheelbase of 114 inches and sweeping improvements in riding comfort, interior luxury, safety and performance. A bigger, more powerful-looking hood now presents an added 10-inch sweep of painted surface that curves around to the new radiator grille. A new, Vee-type windshield adds more than six inches to body length over the belt.

Over-all length is now 82 inches, without bumpers, and the new, 114-inch wheelbase is two inches longer than last year.

#### Orderly Marketing Cotton is Necessary

##### Gore Has Bonded Warehouse.

Orderly marketing and not "dumping" will be the order of the day with cotton farmers this Fall, commented John Gore, manager of the Rockingham Bonded Warehouse, here today upon his return from Raleigh where he attended a conference with more than 60 managers of other State bonded warehouses in North Carolina.

"Our farmers are faced with the shortest crop in 37 years and they fully realize the importance of getting the highest possible price for their cotton," Mr. Gore said.

The meeting in Raleigh was sponsored by the N. C. Cotton Growers Co-operative Association as a means of familiarizing the managers of the official warehouses of the Association with the regulations of the 988 government loan as well as with the government's regulations in regard to the marketing of cotton. M. G. Mann, general manager of the Cotton Association, presided over the meeting and outlined to the assembled warehousemen the many advantages the "Re-Purchase Pool" plan offers to the farmer in the marketing of his cotton.

Mr. Gore stated that his warehouse is prepared to get for farmers the government loan and that furthermore, as the official warehouse of the Cotton Association in this section, it can obtain the loan in such a way that the farmer will secure all of the advantages of the "Re-Purchase Pool" in the marketing of his cotton.

Mr. Gore, who inspected the new home of the Cotton Association while in Raleigh, said that he was most favorably impressed with the Association's classing room where every bale is classed under the direct supervision of a government licensed "classer." Emphasizing the importance of farmers securing their government loan in such a way as to get a fair class and the full grade and staple premium, the local warehouseman manager pointed out that the premiums allowed on the government loan run as high as \$12.25 per 500-pound bale for good middling inch and one-eighth or longer cotton. Other typical premiums, based on a 500-pound bale, were given as follows:

Inch and one-sixteenth—good middling or better, \$7.50; strict middling, \$6.75; middling, \$5.00. Inch cotton—good middling or better, \$5.50; strict middling, \$4.50; middling, \$3.00. Fifteen sixteenth—good middling or better, \$4.00; strict middling, \$3.00 middling, \$1.50.
