

IN MEMORY—CARL CROUCH Cooper, Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Crouch and family. The community was shocked and deeply grieved Friday when news was received of the death of Carl C. Crouch in the Hamlet hospital, being carried there only a few hours before.

He had been sick with pneumonia and pleurisy since Saturday night, Sept. 3rd. All that nurses, doctors, friends and loved ones could do was done in an effort to restore him to health, but God saw fit to take him from this life to the Great Beyond. Carl was born Feb. 13th, 1894, at Roberdel, son of Mr. Christopher C. and Sarah E. Crouch. He was married Oct. 1919, to Miss Nell Yates. He is survived by his wife, four sisters and two brothers: Mrs. S. D. Tanner, Mrs. H. J. Covington, Mrs. Geo. Greene of Rockingham, Mrs. Zack Cooper of Concord; Mr. Jerry Crouch of Troy, Dr. Auley Crouch of Wilmington and a host of loved ones.

The funeral was held at the Methodist church Sunday p. m. at 3 o'clock, in charge of Rev. W. L. Lupton, Rev. D. K. Snyder and Davidson and a special friend of Rev. W. T. Smith, the latter of Carl's. The funeral procession was the largest ever known in this community, and the beautiful floral tributes spoke for the friends and loved ones who were left to mourn for Carl.

DEATHS

Carl Crouch Dead

Died Sept. 9th After an Illness of Just Six Days with Pneumonia.

Carl C. Crouch, 44, died at his home at Roberdel at 11:30 the morning of Sept. 9th after an illness of six days with pneumonia. The funeral was from Roberdel Methodist church Sunday afternoon at three o'clock, with burial in Bear Branch cemetery.

He is survived by four sisters and two brothers—Mrs. Zack Cooper of Concord, Mrs. Hamp Covington, Mrs. S. V. Tanner, Mrs. Geo. P. Greene, all of Rockingham, and Jerry Crouch of Troy and Dr. Auley Crouch of Wilmington.

Carl was in the rain on Sept. 3rd and that night suffered a hard chill, and then pneumonia rapidly developed. He became delirious on the 8th, was removed the morning of the 9th to the hospital but died barely two hours afterwards.

He was born Feb. 13, 1894, son of the late Carl Columbus and Sarah Garrett Crouch. He is survived by his wife, who was the former Nell Yates. He was connected with the Davenport Chevrolet agency, in the sales department, at the time of his untimely death.
