Up to press time late this Thursday evening, it was still impossible to get the vote from the other counties. However, the district gives Mr. Burgin about 5500 majority. Davidson county gave him about 350 majority, Montgomery about 650 majority and Moore about 664 majority.

### CRUCIAL GAME PLAYED TODAY

#### Hamlet is Winner

Rockingham Lost Today, Nov. 10, in Play-off Previously Tied Game. Hamlet 12, Rham 7.

On Oct. 21st, Rockingham and Hamlet highs played to a scoreless tie in Hamlet. These two teams held top honors in the district, and so it was arranged for them to play the tie off this Thursday afternoon, Nov. 10th, in Hamlet. The game started at 3:20.

Hamlet won 12-7, and as they hailed as district champions. The winner will now represent the district in Class B competition with the winners in the other districts. The finals between the Eastern and Western Class A and B teams will play at Chapel Hill Nov. 25th for the State championship—the East and West Class B teams playing against each other, and the Class A winners playing each other. Rockingham highs under Coach J. T. Holton has had a splendid season. Out of six games played (not counting today's game), the locals have won five and tied one at 0-0. The locals have run up 89 points to only 7 for the five opponents.

## BURGIN ELECTED TO CONGRESS BY SUBSTANTIAL MAJORITY NOV. 8TH

Smallest Vote Cast in Richmond County Since 1922. All Neighboring Counties Also Cast Record Low Votes. County Ticket Had no Opposition and both Senators Elected.

Republicans Make Big Gains in North and West States. New York Elects Democratic Governor and Legislature.

AMENDMENT TO ELECT SHERIFFS EVERY FOUR YEARS PASSES, RICHMOND COUNTY GAVE MAJORITY AGAINST.

The tabular form on this front page tells the story of the Nov. 8th election completely. You should save it for reference.

It was the smallest vote cast in Richmond county in any election since 1922 when only 2713 voted. In the election Tuesday, approximately 2962 voted, with Bob Reynolds for the U. S. Senate getting 2314, to 648 for Charles A. Jones. This latter figure about truly represents the Republican strength. In the Congressional race, W. O. Burgin received 1943 to 932 for John R. Jones—a Burgin majority of 1011. But the Jones vote was not truly Republican—he being the beneficiary of much "scratching."

This 2962 vote is pitifully small as compared to the 7316 cast by both parties in the 1936 election; and to the 7121 vote in the July 2nd Democratic primary.

However, all neighboring counties likewise cast small votes—around 1348 in Scotland, 2565 in Anson, 2800 in Union, 991 in Hoke, Lee 1644, etc. So on the whole, old Richmond did very well.

Only 42 Absentee ballots were cast—19 of these by sick voters and 23 by those absent from the county.

Among those voting Absentee was C. B. Deane, who is now in a hospital at Wilmington under treatment. He voted the straight ticket, of course.

In Rockingham precinct, a total of 803 voted—787 box votes and 16 Absentees. In this box were 460 straight ballots (445 box and 15 Absentees), and 83 straight Republican tickets. This left a total of 261 who scratched their ballots—with Burgin getting 41 and Jones 169.

At Rohanen, a very small vote was cast—476 for Congress, as against a July 2nd primary vote of 1602. In the 476 votes were 293 straight Democratic and 18 straight Republican votes, with 165 scratching.

In the Rockingham precinct, Jones received 252 and Burgin 501—a majority of 249. In the Hamlet precincts, Jones received 199 and Burgin 496 for a majority of 297. Rohanen gave Burgin only 156 majority—316 to 160. The Norman precinct vote was the closest, with Burgin 47 and Jones 42. At Ellerbe, Jones secured 92 to Burgin's 142. Black Jack township voted practically nothing—only 25 votes in all, with 16 Burgin, 7 Jones.

Crosland was the only precinct (Continued on page Ten)

### Only 42 Absentees

Only 42 Absentees were voted in Richmond county in the Nov. 8th, 1938, election—23 by those absent from the county, and 19 by those sick.

This number is in contrast to the 447 cast in the hot July 2nd primary when 7121 votes were cast. In this Nov. 8th election, only 2950 votes, Democratic and Republican, were cast.
