U. D. C. MEMORIAL HONORS 42 WOMEN

Large Gathering Present at Exercises at Confederate Women's Home at Fayetteville.

Fayetteville, Nov. 6.—A large gathering, including many leaders of the United Daughters of the Confederacy from various parts of the State, this afternoon witnessed the unveiling of the monument to the 42 women of the Confederacy who are buried at the North Carolina Confederate Woman's Home here.

The monument was a gift from the North Carolina Division of the U. D. C. and was presented by Mrs. John Huske Anderson of Raleigh, division president, to Mrs. E. R. MacKethan, president of the J. E. B. Stuart Chapter, who in turn made the presentation to Charles G. Rose, chairman of the board of directors of the State-owned home.

Mrs. Anderson paid tribute to Mrs. MacKethan for proposing the erection of the memorial. She was presented by Mrs. J. Ed. Woodard of Wilson, past State president. Another past president who was presented was Mrs. R. E. Little of Wadesboro, who was division president when the home was built and was present at its opening in 1915.

The granite stone was unveiled by little Marguerite Grady, grand-daughter of the late Mrs. Hunter G. Smith, founder of the home, and little Thomas Wooten, Mrs. Anderson's grandson. It was draped with a large silk Confederate flag. The graves in the home cemetery had been decorated with red and white flowers by members of the Junior Auxiliary of the J. E. B. Stuart Chapter.
