

A little girl, just eight years old, named Virginia and Mrs. Zena Greene read a O'Hanlon, had written a letter to the SUN asking whether poem. A Christmas Story was there really is a Santa Claus. The editor turned the letter

Here is the little girl's letter:

"Dear Mr. Editor: I am eight years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. But papa says if you see it in the SUN, it is so. Please tell me the truth-IS THERE A SANTA CLAUS?-Virginia O'Hanlon."

And here is the answer—as old as Time, as fresh as Sunday evening December 22 at Today, and as young as Tomorrow:

> "Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible to their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or little children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

> Yes, Virginia, there IS a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus. It would be as dreary as if there were no Vira ginia's. There would be no child-like faith then, no poetry, no romance. We would have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the

> world would be extinguished. Not believe in Santa Claus? You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can comceive or imagine all the wonders there are unseen and unseeable in the world.

> You may tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, or even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is

> nothing else so real and abiding. No Santa Claus? Thank God; he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay, ten times ten thousand years from now he will continue to make glad the heart of
