## Charged With Murder.

Jno. B. Brackville, Lou Hall and Amy McNair were lodged in jail at this place on Monday on a charge of having murdered Chas. McNair on the plantation of Neill A. McNair, Esq., in the lower end of this county, on the 2nd inst. The parties—all of whom are colored, as is also the murdered man—had a preliminary hearing before Esquire McNeill on Sunday morning, and the evidence, although purely circumstantial, was sufficient to bind them over to court.

Taking another from the show case Mr. Morrissey remarked, "Well, here's one that is not too hard," at the same time snapping it. An explosion and an ear-piercing cry, "Oh, Lordy, I've shot!" caused Money to turn as white as Hamlet's ghost, and to quake and tremble more than did Belshazzler of old, but an examination showed the wound to be nothing serious, though quite painful. ## Celebration at Spring Hill.

Ms. Errors.—The Richmond Temperance and Literary Society celebrated its 29th anniversary to-day, (26th Sept.)—Twenty-nine years ago this community was quite intemperate. (Idle drinking was as common as fodder pulling and the two went hand in hand, with the odds in favor of the cider drinking. When the cider "played out" something stronger was resorted to, and thus matters went from bad to worse until two young men in the neighborhood, seeing the danger ahead, talked the matter over and resolved to organize a Temperance Society. The formation of a Literary Society had been talked of previous to this; and these young men suggested that Temperance be added. Hence the organization of the Richmond Temperance and Literary Society. Those two young men were Neill D. Johnson, who died in the late war but who will live in the hearts of this people while temperance has a friend, and Daniel W. Livingston, who still lives to see the wonderful results of the seed sown twenty-nine years ago! Pardon me, Mr. Editor, for taking so much of your valuable space in giving this brief sketch of the formation of our Society.

Well, we met to-day to celebrate the 29th birthday of our grand old Society, and a gala day it was. The weather was all that could be desired. By 11 o'clock, the hour for exercises to commence, a large crowd had gathered in the church (the hall being too small to hold the crowd) to hear the address of Mr. Chas. W. Tillett, one of the speakers of the occasion. For an hour he entertained and delighted his audience with one of the "strongest" speeches to which it has ever been the pleasure of this scribe to listen. He handled the subject of temperance so manfully, and made such bold and fearless attacks against the great evil, intemperance, that he completely won the admiration of all who heard him. He then took up the subject of literature and showed the great advantages offered by this feature of our Society. Mr. Tillett made many warm friends in this section.

After the speech of Mr. Tillett the audience adjourned to the grove where a sumptuous dinner was spread, of which all partook, and many baskets of fragments were taken up. Rev. Mr. May, who was expected to be present, was detained by sickness and sent as his substitute Rev. E. D. Cameron, of Laurinburg, who spoke in the afternoon. Mr. Cameron didn't know till this morning that he would be here to-day and of course his remarks were extemporaneous, but he proved himself equal to the occasion and made a stirring and telling speech.

At the close of Mr. Cameron's speech the members repaired to the hall, where four new members were received. Thus ended one of the most pleasant anniversaries of our Society, and we trust and believe that lasting good was done. We enter upon our 30th year with renewed energy and bright prospects.—The ladies of our Society have improved the looks of our beautiful little hall very much by carpet, curtains, pictures
