Stock and Dairy Farming.

Cor. Charlotte Observer.

Your allusion to the visit of a prominent dairyman of Maryland to this section, with the view of removing his business South, should remind our people of another important change needed to redeem our agriculture from the thraldom of cotton curse. I refer to stock ruising. In this line the possibilities are even greater than dairying; and the secret lies in the unfold riches of two grasses now spreading all over the country, and usually regarded as "Farmers' Pests," but which are unrivalled for summer pasturage. I allude to the two grasses variously called, the one the Means, Johnson or guinea grass; the other the cane, wire or Bermuda grass. These f pests" will soon take the country under its present system of shipshod farming. But they can be easily and profitably utilized in stockgrowing. They are not well suited for the dairyman. They are rather coarse and do not make first class hutter. Blue grass and clover are the grasses for that, and this section is not yet quite ready for these. We need shade for the one and rich clay for the other. Both may be somethat utilized in improving our lands, but as a general thing they are not a success here.

What we most need is a judicious study of our soil and climate; thrift and skill in mixed agriculture; and, above all, the steady application of the eapital and brains of the South to its vast and varied resources. This would soon make our cotton and tobacco (as they ought to be) the sources of untold wealth, and at the same time, speedily drive from our streets, instead of along them lumbering loads of Yankee hay, and hobbling hordes of Western hogs, to sty nothing of Dutch cabbage, Irish potatoes, Kentucky mules and Texas pinies, the two latter, at times, literally taking the town. In the light of these strange sights, in a and popularly supposed to "flow with milk and honey," and capable of producing every article needed for man or beast, the late stir at Raleigh over the "Agricultural Department' comes in apt time. We need a little agricultural breeze to set the farmers themselves to thinking, and see if they can't stir up the political "museum."
