

Proposed Work of the Experiment Station.

The Experiment Station is now able, through the assistance derived from funds appropriated by Congress, for the benefit of the agricultural experiment stations in the various States, in addition to what it has done and is doing now to attempt work in a new direction entirely different from that heretofore.

This new departure will, it is believed, prove of great advantage to many of the people of the State. An experimental dairy and farm will be built and equipped and experiments will be carried on to ascertain by actual feeding experiments the value of the various food stuffs—hay, grasses and forage plants; to ascertain the digestibility of various foods and the effect on the yield of milk and butter; to determine the relative value of green forage crops as ensilage compared to the forage in the dry state, and to carry on various investigations requiring careful work, chemical examination of all products before and after they are digested, and scientific skill to reach those results which will prove of practical value.

That this work is much needed and in the right direction will be recognized from the fact that North Carolina had in 1880 (the last census) 232,133 milch cows and 375,105 other cattle, exclusive of working oxen, sheep and other stock. At a valuation of \$50 a piece the total will be nearly fourteen million dollars. The dairy products alone from these milch cows amounted in one year to 446,793 gallons of milk consumed; 7,212,507 of butter and 57,380 lbs. cheese. Valuing the milk at 25 cents per gallon, the butter and cheese at 30 and 13 cents respectively, the annual production will amount to over a million and a half dollars. These figures for 1888 will be largely in excess of those for 1880.

Is not this field in which already so many millions of dollars are invested with an annual product of over a million and a half dollars in dairy products (not to speak of the value of the stable manure produced) a field of sufficient importance to merit scientific investigation in order to make the products more valuable, and to improve and increase the number of live stock already engaged in making these products? A field, too, in which nothing has heretofore been done in this State in the way proposed? Our citizens, we have no doubt, will answer in the affirmative, and will endorse the proposed plan.
