

Manufactures in the South.

In his inaugural address President Harrison remarks that it was only the existence of slavery in this section that prevented the cotton-producing States from spinning their own fabrics at home.

Just how far slavery prevented this we need not discuss, but slavery exists no longer, and the conditions that he alludes to are beginning to assert themselves. The South is investing in manufactures at a very rapid rate. The cotton mill is getting nearer and nearer to the cotton-plant, and this fact is having its influence in New England.

We are told that a great many mill men in that section are arranging to transfer their capital and their plants to the South, and when once this movement is begun it will never end until all the cotton-spinning and weaving establishments in that bleak region are transferred to the South. Here are the climate, the cheap labor that can be made expert, and all the possibilities that can make large dividends.

A dispatch from Boston not many days old says that the manufacturers at Fall River, in spite of their large dividends and profitable contracts for six months to come, are already undergoing the mental process of transferring their mills to the South. One of the Fall River manufacturers has recently visited the Southern mills, and his account of what he saw has created a feeling of unrest in the minds of his associates. The idea is that while the New England cotton factories are fairly prosperous, they can be made far more profitable by transferring their machinery and their methods to the cotton fields.

This feeling and this movement will grow and gain in volume. All the New England factories will not come hither at once like a flock of sheep, but there is not a doubt that competition will compel them to come after awhile. Here the climate is perfect, the cotton fibre can be spun and woven to the greatest perfection under the genial sun that grew it, and it has been shown that factories in the South have a great advantage in the matter of freights.—Atlanta Constitution.
