

it would pass, of the construction of a road from Southport, N. C., to Bristol, Tenn., passing by Rockingham and through upper Richmond. He said that it had taken long and sufficiently strong, financially, to undertake the enterprise, but that they now had their arrangements about complete to go to work. 000 to construct the road, and that capitalists had to have some assurance of a safe investment and a sure return for their money before investing it, but that a careful investigation had been made by competent persons and that they were now convinced that the road would pay, and would develop one of the finest sections of country to be found any-




