NOTICE.

Chapter, 815 of the 1903 North Carolina Laws, Enacted.

An act requiring claims against Richmond county to be presented within six months.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. That all persons holding claims against the county of Richmond that were issued before the division of Richmond county and the creation of Scotland county, that before the 1st Monday in December, 1903, shall be and they are hereby required to present the same to the Board of Arbitrators heretofore appointed to audit the outstanding indebtedness against said county of Richmond, and apportion the amount of indebtedness that is justly due by each of said counties respectively, within six months from the ratification of this act.

Section 2. That claims which are not presented to said Board of Arbitrators before the expiration of six months from the ratification of this act shall be barred, and that this statute may be pleaded in bar of recovery. Provided, that this act shall not be construed to require a representation of claims which have already been presented to said arbitrators.

Section 3. That notice of the provision of this act shall be published four successive weeks in some newspaper published in Richmond county and for four successive weeks in some newspaper published in Scotland county.

Section 4. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

In the General Assembly read three times and ratified this 9th day of March, A. D. 1903.

In accordance with the provisions of the foregoing Act, notice of which is hereby given, all persons holding claims of any description, including Bonds, against Richmond county, which have not already been presented under our former notice either to the Register of Deeds of Richmond or Scotland, are hereby required to present the same to one of the officers aforesaid on or before the 9th day of September 1903.

The Register of deeds will note on the claim the date of its presentation, and forward to the undersigned a list of all claims so presented, giving date, amount and name of owner.
