An act requiring claims against Rich mond county to be presented within six The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

SECTION I. That all persons holding laims against the county of Pichmor that were issued before the divison Richmond county and the creation of Scotland county, that is, before the 1st Monday in December, 1900, shall be and they are hereby required to present the same to the Board of Arbitrators heretofore appointed to audit the outstanding indebtedness against said county of Richmond and apportion the amount of in Overseers are expected to do their mond, and apportion the amount of in-debtedness that is justly due by each of said counties respectively, within six months from the ratification of this act.

SEC, 2. That claims which are no presented to said Board of Arbitrators before the expiration of six months from the ratification of this act shall be barred, and that this statute may be pleaded in bar of recovery, Provided, that this act shall not be constitued to required a representation of claims which have already the same as original deposit. been presented to said arbitraiors.

SEC. 3. That notice of the provision of this act shall be published four successive weeks in some newspaper published in Richmond county and for four successive weeks in some newspaper published in Scotland county.

SEC. 4. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification. In the General Assembly read three times and ratified this 9th day of March A. D. 1903.
