A prohibition campaign will soon be in full swing throughout the state. The law which the anti-saloon people are advocating and which has been passed by the legislature in extra session and is only waiting to be ratified by a majority vote of the people to become an effective law is, primarily, a law to prevent any intoxicating liquors from being sold anywhere in the state.

200 MEN LOOSE THEIR JOBS

Seaboard Cuts off About Two Hundred Men.

Hamlet, Feb. 12th.—Officials of the Seaboard held two executive sessions here today. All officials of the system from the president down were here. The meeting was held in the interest of curtailment of expenses. No salaries were reduced, but about two hundred men were cut off, ranging in salary from \$500 to \$2000. It was decided that there would be no reduction of salary anywhere on the system. President Garrett left tonight on No. 32 for Portsmouth and General Manager Whittelsen on No. 41 for the South.

Rev. Angus Johnson died at his home at Avalon, Texas, on January 19th. He was born in Robeson county, N. C., on Aug. 26, 1808. At 15 he went to Cheraw as a tailor's apprentice. There he joined the Presbyterian church. In 1836 he entered the ministry, and has served many churches in several States during the 72 years of his ministry.

Two years ago Mr. Johnson and his wife paid a visit to old friends in the Carolinas. He preached at Cheraw April 22, 1906, where he was licensed to preach on April 10th 1836.

He was a third cousin to President Andrew Johnson, who was also a tailor in North and South Carolina.—Pee Dee Advocate.
