DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION

Held in Halifax at Noon on Saturday, May 23--Election of Delegates--Resolutions of Endorsement and a Not Prohibition Fight

The Democratic County Convention, assembled in Halifax on last Saturday, May 23, at noon, for the purpose of naming delegates to the State Convention and the Congressional and Judicial Conventions and was called to order by W. E. Daniel, of Weldon.

Mr. Daniel appointed Raymond Dunn, of Enfield, temporary Chairman, D. E. Stainback, of the Weldon Roanoke News, and J. T. Stainback, of the Roanoke Rapids Herald, temporary Secretaries. On motion this organization was made permanent.

The roll of the townships was called by the Secretary, all being represented. W. E. Daniel moved that the Convention proceed to the election of delegates to State, Congressional and Judicial Conventions. The Chairman announced that each township was entitled to one delegate and alternate to the State Convention and each of the four larger townships (Roanoke Rapids, Weldon, Enfield and Scotland Neck) a delegate at large each.

Each township named its delegates as follows: Brinkleyville, F. M. Taylor, delegate, J. E. Ayres, Jr., alternate; Butterwood, N. W. Warren, delegate, J. R. Patterson, alternate; Conocanary, J. H. Darden, delegate, J. L. King, alternate; Enfield, R. C. Dunn, W. T. Clement, delegates, Dr. A. S. Harrison, J. W. Whitaker, alternates; Faucetts, E. W. Lyles, delegate, W. L. Dickens, alternate; Halifax, E. L. Travis, delegate, N. L. Stedman, alternate; Palmyra, W. D. White, delegate, L. W. Leggett, alternate; Littleton, W. A. Johnston, delegate, J. W. King, alternate; Roseneath, W. H. Ivey, delegate, I. H. Locus, alternate; Scotland Neck, N. A. Riddick, J. H. Shields, delegates, Stuart Smith and Gresham Harper, alternates; Roanoke Rapids, W. L. Long, A. L. Clark, delegates, J. W. House, J. T. Stainback, alternates; Weldon, W. E. Daniel, Geo. C. Green, delegates, A. C. House, W. L. Knight, alternates.

W. E. Daniel introduced a resolution endorsing Congressman Claude Kitchin for re-nomination and appointing as delegates to the Congressional Convention to be held in Rocky Mount on June 2, all of Congressman Kitchin's friends who desire to attend. This resolution was unanimously carried.

Dr. A. S. Harrison introduced a resolution endorsing Solicitor Jno. H. Kerr of Warren for re-nomination. This resolution was carried and the convention appointed itself as a delegate body to the Judicial Convention to be held in Weldon on May 29.

Following an enthusiastic speech of W. E. Daniel, the Convention by a rising vote signified its hearty endorsement for re-nomination of Hon. E. L. Travis for Chairman of the North Carolina Corporation Commission.

Dr. I. E. Green, of Weldon, who was unable to attend the convention on account of a very sick patient in Weldon, offered through Mr. Daniel, a resolution endorsing the candidacy of Senator Lee S. Overman. This resolution was carried.

A. C. House, of Weldon, introduced a resolution pledging the candidates for the Legislature to work for the passage of a bill to prohibit the shipment of liquor into the State. This resolution was hotly contested on various grounds, principally on the ground that the resolution was beyond the province of the convention. Mr. House amended his resolution by striking out the word "pledge" and substituting the word "request". After a spirited contest the chair ordered

SEABOARD MAY RELOCATE

Preliminary Survey of Engineer Looks Encouraging. Relocation would Eliminate Bad Curve

Mr. Hughes, one of the Seaboard Air Line's engineers was here on Monday and Tuesday making an extensive survey of the towns and environs with a view to ascertaining the probable route of the Seaboard Air Line tracks if relocated and the cost of making this change.

This survey, as will be recalled, is the result of the visit here of Messrs. Cheatham, James and Darden some weeks ago. At that time the question of relocating the tracks of the Seaboard so that a passenger station could be placed somewhere in reach of the population was taken up with these gentlemen.

Mr. Hughes states that in his opinion the change would be advantageous from the railroad's point of view, provided the relocated tracks crossed Roanoke Avenue somewhere between Eighth and Tenth Streets. This relocation would cut out a bad curve between here and Bolling and would shorten the track to some extent.

The right of way stated above would also have the advantage of grade, only one fill being necessary in the whole line. Mr. Hughes also went over the ground near Roanoke Rapids and decided that the project of bringing the railroad through Roanoke Rapids proper was not feasible.

The proposed line would cross Roanoke Avenue about two blocks and a half below Patterson Store Company (towards Roanoke Rapids) and the shorten the present distance from Roanoke Rapids to the passenger station by nearly half.

This relocation would be of immense advantage to the whole section of the community. Mr. Hughes, of course, was unable to state what action the Seaboard officials would take in the matter but in view of the favorable report he will render on the proposition, the situation looks very encouraging.

A new passenger station Roanoke Avenue, between here and Rosemary may become an accomplished fact after all. Anyrate only a short time will lapse before the matter is one way or the other.
