The Supreme Court has declared the Grandfather Clause of the State of Oklahoma invalid, this decision probably applying the literacy test to the white as well as colored voters. We think that a white man in this day and time who cannot read is no better qualified to cast a ballot than the negro who cannot read.

"It is a high crime, according to Herr Von Jagow, that American manufacturers should be permitted to sell arms and munitions to the nations allied in war against Germany. But Germany claimed and exercised the right to supply weapons and cartridges from her factories to the Boers during the struggle with Great Britain and to send arms and equipments to the Spanish during the war in Cuba between that power and the United States. Is a thing right when done by Germany and wrong when done by any other country? International law has always recognized and still recognizes that private citizens and concerns in a neutral country have a right to sell arms and ammunition to any and all belligerents who may choose to buy, the arms and ammunition being, of course, subject to capture and confiscation while in process of delivery. The rest of the world can not concede that a rule is proper when it works in Germany's favor, but contrary to justice and humanity when it effects adversely German interests."
