TRI-TOWN LEAGUE WILL REORGANIZE

Emporia, Franklin and Roanoke Rapids Will Compete Again for Championship Pennant. Ten Week's Season with Strict Salary Limit for All Players

SUBSCRIBE FOR SEASON TICKETS NOW

That fact baseball will be played here this season is now an established fact, concretely evidenced by the arrival here on Thursday of Manager Holloman, of Norfolk, Va., and two members of the team. Mr. Holloman states that he believes Roanoke Rapids' chances for capturing the pennant again are exceptionally good this season, as he has the makings of a cracking good team engaged or in view. More players are expected to arrive to-day and to-morrow and the team will begin practicing at once for the opening game of the league which will be played by Roanoke Rapids at Emporia on Wednesday, June 7.

While financial arrangements for the operation of the team through the season have not been finally concluded, nevertheless sufficient donations have been pledged to start in the league, the Directors of the Association realizing that money will come in more freely after the schedule of games has actually been begun. Everyone desiring to see good baseball here this summer is urged to subscribe for a season ticket at once and if possible make an additional donation towards operating expenses.

Any of the officers or directors of the Roanoke Rapids Baseball Association will gladly receive donations toward the operation of the team.

These officers are W. L. Long, President; J. T. Stainback, Secretary and Treasurer; S. J. Bounds, H. W. Cherry, Dr. D. F. Patchin, J. P. Robinson, W. D. Tillery, Dr. T. W. M. Long, and J. M. Jackson, directors.

The Tri-Town League will be conducted this year along lines more "safe and sane" as far as finances are concerned than was the case last year. All three teams have entered into a binding agreement limiting the maximum salaries to be paid in the league as follows: field-captains not to exceed the rate of \$75.00 per month; pitchers not to exceed the rate of \$65.00 per month; catchers and utility men not to exceed the rate of \$60.00 per month; all other players not to exceed the rate of \$50.00 per month.

No player under contract with any organized baseball league may be used nor may any player be hired from another team in the Tri-Town league until such player has been released.

Mr. S. F. Patterson has been elected President of the Tri-Town League and in the event of a dispute arising between two teams in the league, he is authorized to call a conference between representatives of the several teams for the purpose of settling such dispute. If the conferees should be unable to agree the President is to lay the matter before the sporting editor of the Virginian-Pilot for final decision.

An umpire is to be hired by the League to umpire all League games; his salary and expenses to be assessed equally upon each team by the President.

FIRE DOORS AND SHUTTERS

Loss by Recent Raleigh Fire Would Have Been Small Had Buildings Been Properly Equipped.

One of the lessons of the recent fire in Raleigh was to show the import ance of having property within the fire district protected by fire doors and shutters and in seeing that the buildings were not only thus equipped but that the doors and shutters were kept in working condition and properly closed each night. The loss by this fire would have been small if even the few buildings had been properly equipped. An examination during the fire showed that many of the fire shutters were open and the inflammable property inside of the building exposed to sparks.

The Insurance Department is doing all it can in the way of helping cities and towns as well as individual property owners by inspections and advice as to the best means of protection. The Commissioner says that he will have any building in the State inspected and a full detail made of what is necessary to do for this protection if the owner will only assure him that he is anxious and willing to do what ever he can for the protection of his own property as well as that of his neighbors.

Getting Ready For Summer

In order to spend a comfortable, healthful summer whether at home or at some resort, says the State Board of Health, one must look first to diet, then to his bathing, and then to his sleep, exercise and recreation. A few general precautions are also included in the list.

The diet should consist largely of raw and cooked fruit, well cooked vegetables, milk and butter, but very little of meat, eggs and heavy foods. One should eat less in summer than in winter especially of heat producing foods such as meats, eggs and pastries. Besides producing heat they tend to constipation and mental sluggishness. Drink much water but not quantities of ice water. Above all avoid constipation.

Take a bath every day. A cold sponge-bath every morning on getting out of bed and a tub bath at night will do much toward keeping the body in good condition and will make for comfort as well.

Sleep regularly eight hours. If at all practical, sleep out on a sleeping porch. Arrange to sleep in as much moving air as possible. Nothing enables one to withstand the moist heat of summer with ease as plenty of undisturbed sleep in the open air.

Exercise some every day. Open air games in the cool of the day are good for both the mind and the body. Don't leave off walking because the weather is warm. Walk early in the morning or late in the afternoon. Walking is always essential to health.

Recreation is another form of mental and physical rest which is necessary to mental and physical health. Vacations, outings, camping parties - anything that will give diversion, that will break the monotony and grind - will be beneficial and health-making.

Other precautions making for personal comfort during the summer are: Don't talk hot weather, don't think heat; avoid as much as possible direct exposure to the sun; wear light-weight clothing; go slow and do nothing in excess; don't dissipate, don't over-eat or indulge in alcoholic. But think of the joys of summer and make up your mind to enjoy them freely.

Statewide Primary Elections To-morrow To-morrow, Saturday, June 3, is the date of the first Statewide Primary Elections every authorized by statute in North Carolina. All state officers, members of Congress, district officers and members of the present General Assembly will be nominated. The primary will be open from sunrise, 4:45, to sunset, 7:11. Precinct No. 1, Roanoke Rapids Townships, all territory north of Eighth Street including town of Roanoke Rapids, will vote at the regular polling place, old schoolhouse building on Hamilton Street. Precinct No. 2, Roanoke Rapids Township, all territory south of Eighth Street, including Rosemary, will vote at the schoolhouse building belonging to the Rosemary Manufacturing Company, located on Monroe Street. The Primary Election is in reality more important than the General Elections - don't neglect to cast your vote for the men you think best fitted to hold office.
