## SITUATION GROWS SERIOUS FOR FARMERS AND RAILROADS

That the fertilizer movement has been slow this year and that congestion of traffic is probable unless farmers put in their orders at once, is the burden of an announcement issued yesterday by the Railroad Director's Bureau, which is as follows:

"Please let me say a word to our farmer patrons.

"The normal yearly movement of fertilizers in this region runs from three million to five million tons. This means, in round figures, 100,000 carloads to be handled.

"Ordinarily most of this very large item of traffic is thrown on the railroads in the months of January, February and March. Great activity on their part is necessary to handle the tonnage well.

"By February 10, at least 30 per cent of the whole fertilizer tonnage has usually been shipped, but this year less than 15 per cent has moved so far; that is to say, the movement on this date is about 50,000 cars short of what it should have been.

"It is easy for you to see what I fear.

"A flood of business at the last moment cannot be moved to the satisfaction of our patrons and complaints will surely follow. We are anxious to avoid complaints, but it is obvious that we cannot move all of this tonnage at one time. In order to do the job right it is necessary that it be well distributed throughout the whole three months.

"During the past four or five weeks car conditions and conditions have been favorable, but the fertilizers have not moved freely and immediate activity is necessary to avoid a condition which will be serious alike to the farmers and the railroads."

## U. S. Marine Corps Offering Special Inducements

The U. S. Marine Corps is offering special inducements to men who have knowledge of motor mechanics. These men, after being accepted are sent to the training station at Parris Island, S. C., for the remainder of their military training, and after completing the course, if qualified, are sent to duty with the Aviation section.

The chance of quick promotion in this branch of the service today is excellent, and men of ability are quickly put to the front.

There are recruiting stations in Richmond, Va., Charleston, W. Va., and Roanoke, Va. If it is not convenient to apply to these stations, any men wishing to enlist in the Marine Corps can apply to their local postmaster, who will have them examined, and if passed, they will be transferred to Richmond, Va., and from there to the training station at Parris Island, S. C.
