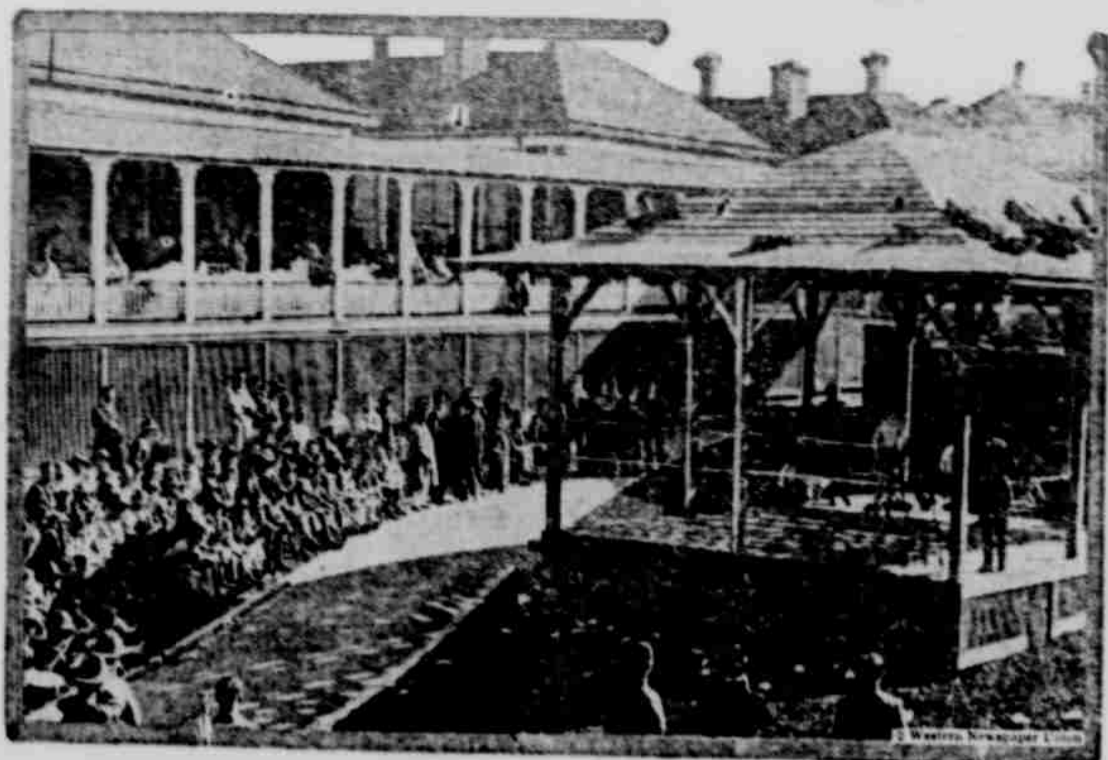
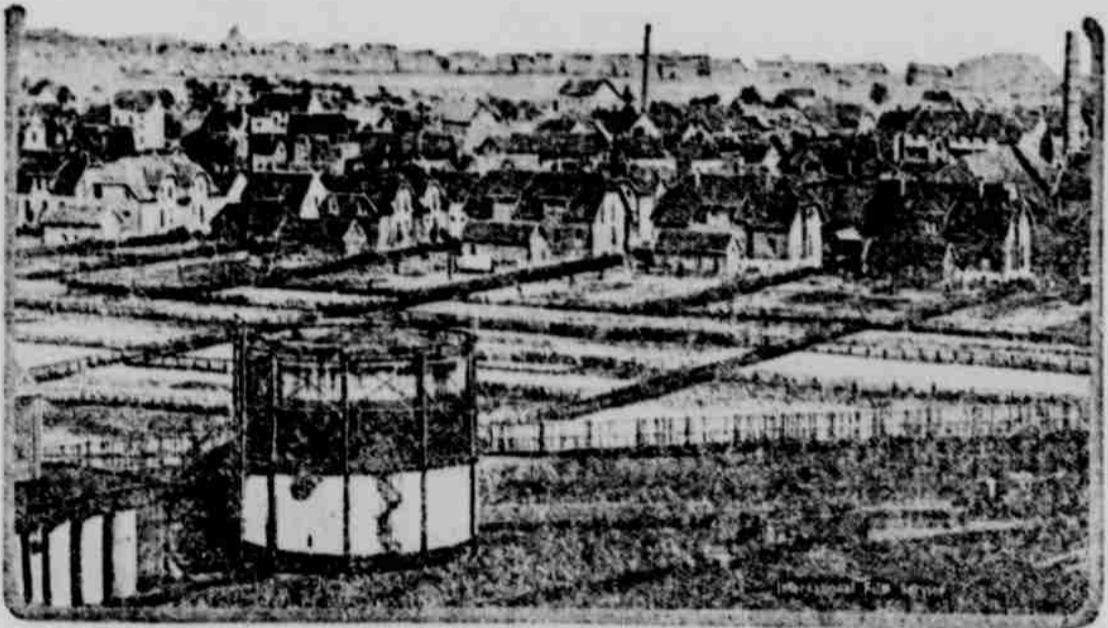


ENTERTAINING WOUNDED AND SICK SOLDIERS

CONQUEST OF THE AIR

AERIAL SERVICE FOR PASSENGERS, MAIL AND MERCHANDISE.

BIRD MEN MEET NEXT MONTH

Big Convention of Pan-American Aeronauts Will Stimulate Enlistments in the U. S. Air Service.

Atlantic City, New Jersey, will be the Mecca for a large gathering of American men, and representatives of foreign countries who will be attracted by the first Pan-American Aeronautics Convention, which meets there in May.

Captain Charles J. Giddens of the U. S. Air Service, Military Aeronautics, now stationed in the administrative department of the United States Flying School, Southfield, Georgia, says:

The Pan-American Aeronautics Convention and exhibition to be held at Atlantic City during the month of May will bring to the attention of American people the wonderful progress of aviation. The work of air craft during the war establishes its practicability for commercial uses and insures the creation in this country of a complete aerial service connecting all cities and towns for the transportation of persons, mail and merchandise.

Before the close of 1920 I confidently predict this service will be in full operation, with extensions to all countries on this hemisphere. In the United States trunk lines will be established across the country which will place every city and town within six hours from some twenty-four distributing points. Once created and in operation an extensive coast line could be put under complete protection from any possible invasion. Thousands of college trained aviators in and out of the service are now waiting to join in the operation of an aerial service.

The government calls for fifteen thousand men to enlist in air service for one or three years' time. This is bound to receive a quick response, as here is an opportunity for men to be immediately assigned to duty in the service and of the number who enlist those who pass certain examinations will be given flying and balloon pilot instruction. This liberal offer is equivalent to a one or three year's college course in aeronautics, and one may become expert in all branches of aviation, and if qualified a non-commissioned or even a commissioned pilot of the aircraft. As the number of men wanted is limited to fifteen thousand for the entire country, quick application to the nearest recruiting office will be necessary before the privilege is withdrawn.

Everybody directly and indirectly interested in aviation should attend the Atlantic City convention and exhibition in order to keep abreast with the times and become familiar with the development of aircraft for defense and commercial uses and witness the demonstrations of the world's greatest airplane aviators, who will fly, and balloon pilots sail to the Atlantic air port from all over the country.

THE FARMERS OF AMERICA STANDING WITH THE SOUTH

Denver—Removal of government restriction on the marketing of the cotton crop and reduction in acreage planted to cotton were urged at the meeting of the Farmers' Educational and Co-operative Union of America in convention here. Speakers pointed out that a more diversified farming plan would aid in development of the South, which has been handicapped by confining farming operations to cotton.

A report by the committee on cotton and cotton products said:

"There have been more severe restrictions on cotton ever since the beginning of the war than on any other farm product. Even today there are restrictions on the trade with our allies."

"With these facts as a basis we feel justified in asking our government to make every effort to have these restrictions removed at the earliest possible moment."

The report also advocated reduction in the acreage of cotton, declaring that the South had been brought to industrial slavery by dependence upon one crop.

LOAN SHOULD BE ABSORBED BY SAVINGS OF THE PUBLIC

Washington—Liberty Loan committee of the several reserve districts were urged by the treasury department to conduct their Victory Loan campaigns with a view to securing the largest possible proportion of subscriptions from private investors.

The loan should be absorbed by the public and paid for out of the savings of the public, said a telegram to the committee. Resources of banking institutions should be left free.

RAINFALL AND TEMPERATURE FAVOR PLANTING OF COTTON

Washington—Moderate rainfall and temperatures somewhat above normal gave conditions favorable for cotton planting, germination of seed and growth of that which is up in much of the eastern portion of the belt, but the season continues later than the average. From the Mississippi Valley westward continued rains and cool weather further delayed the preparation of soil and planting is progressing slowly.

THE HOLY SPIRIT OUR HELPER.

LESSON FOR APRIL 27

THE HOLY SPIRIT OUR HELPER.

LESSON TEXT.—John 14:15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31.

PHILIPY TALKS.—A House of all Times.

JENNIE TALKS.—The Power of the Spirit.

INFORMATIVE TOPIC.—The Fruit of the Spirit.

1. The Holy Spirit Promised (John 14:15).

1. Who he is. He is a divine personality, one to identify with the Father and the Son.

2. What is his mission? (v. 14-15).

(1) The Christian's comforter, (2) The Holy Spirit is Christ's representative who stands by the side of the believer to strengthen, encourage, defend from the enemy and plead his cause before God the Father. Jesus knew and told the disciples of the latter personages which awaited them as soon as he had taken his departure. What a blessed privilege to have the Holy Spirit in and upon us to give wisdom to discern God's will, and power to overcome temptation!

(2) The world's judge (v. 18, 19). Victory is to be achieved by the Spirit working in and through the disciples.

(3) He will convict the world of sin (v. 8). The root of all sin is unbelief in Christ (v. 10). This unbelief is not primarily intellectual, but moral. It is an unwillingness to surrender to the divine will (John 8:18, 19). The way the Holy Spirit convicts the world is through the testimony of those who are filled with him. (4) He will convict the world of righteousness (v. 8). This is done through the resurrection and ascension of Christ (v. 19). His coming forth from the grave and ascension into heaven was an irrefragable proof that he was what he claimed to be. He is thus shown to be the righteous one whose merit may be appropriated by faith in him. This is ever the way of salvation—conviction of sin and appropriation of the righteousness of Christ. (5) He will convict the world of judgment to come (v. 21). Christ told of a judgment to come. The guarantee of this judgment is that Satan, the prince of the world, was judged at the cross (v. 11); cf. John 12:31).

(6) The Christian's guide into all truth (v. 26). The Bible is a spiritual book, therefore if one would know its meaning he must have the Holy Spirit (1 Cor. 2:14).

(7) He glorifies Christ (v. 14, 15). He does not speak of himself, but in all things reveals Christ. The only way to know the glory of the Son of God is to have the Holy Spirit make it known. He reveals all the divine riches and grace that are in Christ. He makes real unto them the person and work of Christ.

2. The Holy Spirit Given (Acts 2:1-4).

1. Time—Pentecost (v. 1). This was fifty days after the Passover Sabbath (Lev. 23:15).

2. The marks of the Spirit (v. 2-4). These are external and internal:

(1) External. (a) Sound of a mighty wind; no wind, but merely the sound of wind. For this sound to be heard in the early morning attracted attention and caused the people to gather. The reference to wind suggests the all-pervasive life-giving influence of the Spirit. (b) Tongues of flame. Each of the disciples was crowned with such a tongue. The tongues indicate the practical possession of the Spirit's gifts, and the fire the purifying energy which removes the dross, thus making effective the testimony.

(c) Speaking in foreign tongues. For these humble Galileans thus to speak caused great amazement.

(2) Internal. This is seen in the transformation wrought in the disciples. Instead of cowering before a Jewish mob, Peter now boldly stood before the chief rulers of the city and declared them to be guilty of murdering the Son of God.

3. The effect (v. 5-13). (1) The multitude assembled in amazement and confusion. They heard the gospel in their native tongues and inquired its meaning. (2) Some mocked and foolishly attempted to account for this remarkable occurrence by accusing the disciples of being drunk.

4. Fulfillment of prophecy (v. 14-18). Wonderful things had occurred but Peter knew where to get an explanation. He went to God's Word (John 2:22, 23). God had predicted just such marvellous occurrences to take place in the last days.

The Higher Interests.

To abandon or lessen spiritual agencies now is fully unwise. Not less than before, but more than before, just because it is a time of crisis, is there need of the regular ministries. The very time when men can least of all afford to turn aside by one jot or tittle from a scrupulous fulfillment of spiritual obligations is in the time of crisis. The higher interests we must remember are the interests first endangered under fatigue and strain, and need therefore all the more careful and steady guarding.

Worry Not About Tomorrow.

Every worrying person is a split self. He does not throw his entire personality into what he is doing now, but allows detachments of his thoughts to wonder what will happen in his next. When Jesus said, "Be not anxious for the morrow, for the morrow will be anxious for itself," he was telling us to be our complete selves today, without detaching a section of ourselves to look out for a tomorrow which may never arrive.—Henry Sloane Coffin.

FIND FLU AND MUMPS GERMS

British Army Surgeons Succeed in Identifying Many Forms of Bacilli.

London.—The virus of trench fever and that of influenza and of some forms of nephritis have been isolated and identified, according to a report submitted to the director general of the army medical service in France, by a number of army medical officers, who have been investigating the causes of these diseases.

The report, which is preliminary to one promised soon, is signed by Maj. Gen. Sir John Rose Bradford, consulting physician with British expeditionary forces in France; Captain Dashford and Captain Wilson, and is printed in the British Medical Journal.

Investigations which have been conducted have resulted, it is believed, in the isolation of the germs of mumps, measles and typhus, the causes of which have hitherto been obscure.

Cranberries \$20 a Barrel.

Chatham, Mass.—Cape Cod cranberries are selling at \$20 a barrel retail. This is the highest price reached since the bogs were first started a hundred years ago. Growers can fill only a small part of their orders, they say, owing to the great demand. The market is also bare of the fruit.
