The circular reads as follows: Vaccination is an absolute guarantee for the prevention of typhoid fever.

Vaccination is harmless. has been administered in this community thousands of times without any bad results. And in no case where it has been administered has there been a case of typhoid fever.

Vaccination consists in giving three hypodermic injections, which are practically harmless, at one week intervals.
