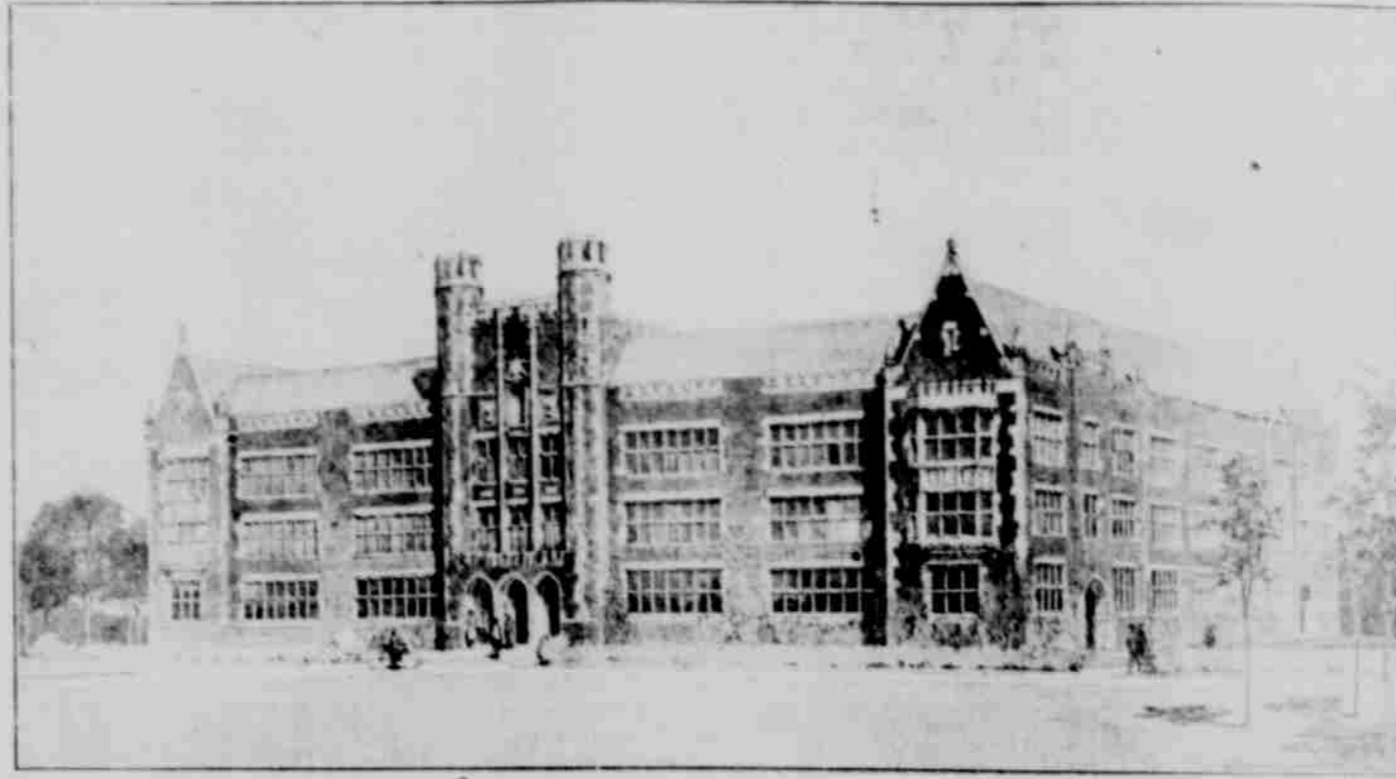

## RALEIGH CONVOCATION IN FALL SESSION

Convened Monday in All Saint's (Episcopal) Church - Many Prominent Delegates Attend.

The Fall Meeting of the Convocation of Raleigh held its meeting in All Saints Episcopal Church this week. The Convocation embraces all the missions and parishes from Hillsboro to Scotland Neck.

At five-thirty on Monday afternoon the first meeting was held for the purpose of organization. The Rt. Rev. Jos. Blount Chesire, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese, presiding, assisted by the Ven. Norvin C. Duncan, of Raleigh, Archdeacon of the Convocation. Mr. Wm. H. Ruffin, a prominent attorney of Louisburg, was elected secretary.

The Rt. Rev. Logan H. Roots, D. D., Bishop of the Missionary District of Hangchow, China, made an illuminating address at the night service describing the Chinese type of mind and showed how they were craving for what the religion of Christ could give them. At this service Bishop Chesire administered the Apostolic Rite of the laying on of hands, commonly known as Confirmation, to a class of fourteen people.

Tuesday morning at 7:30 there was a celebration of the Holy Communion. Archdeacon Duncan celebrant, assisted by Rev. Lewis N. Taylor. Morning prayer was said at nine-thirty by the Rev. Messrs. Walter J. Smith of Charlotte, and Howard S. Hartwell, of Duke. The business session began at ten o'clock when the report of Archdeacon Duncan and of Mr. Wm. L. Wall, of Hillsboro, treasurer were made.

Reports from the missionaries were given for the next hour, showing an encouraging increase in the number of converts. The Rev. J. M. Jones, of Charlotte, was here for the Episcopal Convocation, and was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Wyebe.

## BUILDING PLANS ADOPTED BY BOARD

School Building Plans Adopted by Board - Work to Begin as Soon as Practicable.

Above appears a cut of the new Junior Senior High School Building, as it will appear when finished. This cut was made from a photograph of the proposed building as submitted by Mr. Hobart Upjohn, architect, of New York City. In the latter part of July Mr. Upjohn was employed as the architect for the new building, being chosen over several competitors.

Last Tuesday morning Mr. Upjohn appeared before the School Trustees, with complete plans and specifications, and after due consideration the plans as submitted by the architect were adopted in full.

The Board proposes to begin the erection of the new building at the earliest date possible and there is no reason why it cannot be finished and ready for occupancy at the opening of the new school year next September.

When finished the new building will contain a total of twenty-five class rooms including laboratories for Chemistry and Physics, and an entire section of the ground floor for home economics. Space will also be reserved for a manual training department, and a print shop. The board proposes to make adequate provision for teaching any subject that could be offered in the modern high school.

In addition to the class rooms there is to be one of the most complete auditoriums in the State. Ample provisions will be made for staging the very best shows that may come this way. It will have a seating capacity of more than 2000 seats, and careful provision will be made to have the acoustics the very best.

Underneath the auditorium will be a modern gymnasium with work of St. Mary's School, Raleigh, of which he is rector and Rev. Walter J. Smith reported the work of the Thompson Orphanage, Charlotte. The Rev. Mr. Way voted that a rising vote of thanks be extended to the people of the Church and Community for their generous hospitality in entertaining the members of the Convocation. This was passed by a unanimous vote. A message of sympathy was sent to Rev. S. S. Bost, of Durham who was detained on account of illness. The meeting adjourned at eleven-thirty after prayers and the benediction were said by the Bishop. Immediately afterwards an interesting ceremony took place when the Bishop planted some ivy which come from the plant on Westminster Abbey.

The Convocation was well attended and a splendid interest was shown.
