PLAN OF CO-OPERATIVE NURSING

The County Red Cross Chap- ters in this state are being auth- orized to expend funds for pub- lic health nursing. If such be the desire of their executive committees and where there are whole time health departments it is highly desirable for the Red Cross chapter, if they have the funds in their treasury, to vote the expenditure of the bud- get, which includes salary, car and upkeep of the car of a pub- lic health nurse. The chapters are instructed to appoint a Nurs- ing Activities Committee and through this nursing committee to finance the county nurse, either wholly from chapter funds or from a budget coming partly from chapter funds, partly from county funds, private subscrip- tion or any other supplementary item they may secure. The nurse thus employed is to be detailed for work in the county under the direction of the County Health Officer and her work is to be in conjunction with the State Bu- reau of Infant Hygiene.

The work recommended by the State for the nurse to effect, where she is working under full time health department, in- cludes intensive infant welfare work which consist of the re- porting of pre-natal cases (to whom advisory letters and other literature will be sent) also group and individual instruction to pre-natal cases and instruction in baby feeding and care of the mother; classes for instruction of mid-wives, etc.

The T. B. unit includes quite an extensive plan of health edu- cational work which consists of the showing of T. B. films at schools and public gatherings, demonstrations in the homes of the care of T. B. patients, get- ting in touch with every reported case of T. B. in the county, get- ting up groups of suspected cases of T. B. and persons who have been in close contact with active T. B., etc. for examina- tion by a specialist from the State Sanitorium. Her work will co-operate with the County Medical Profession. The work also includes work in the Bureau of Physical Inspection of School Children and the tonsil and ade- noid clinical work.

This co-operative plan makes a closer co-ordination of work and workers and gives the Red Cross Chapter an opportunity to make a very valuable contribution to the general welfare of the county in a most practical way and admits of professional work being directed by a physician, viz. the Health Officer.

The reports of the nurse's work is made by her in duplicate one copy of which is sent to the County Nursing Activities Committee, the other copy is sent, through the State Bureau of Infant Hygiene, to the Red Cross Divisional Headquarters at Atlanta.

There are nine counties with nurses working on the co-opera- tive plan at present. These are making a very valuable contribu- tion to their county and the Red Cross as a national organization highly endorses this work as it feels that the most valuable con- tribution their chapters can make is to endorse and give financial help for their county public nursing.

Efforts will be made in the near future to get the Red Cross Chapters in Halifax County or- ganized and the plan will be presented to them for consideration. There is a vast field for this work in Halifax County. It gives us a chance to relieve some of the sufferings of our own people and at the same time aid in the upbuilding of the general health standards of our county.

MR. FRANK JOBES KILLED BY AEOPLANE

Was Trying to Aid an Injured Asso- ciate and Struck by Propeller.

A very distressing accident occurred Friday afternoon at 4:30 when Mr. Frank Jobes, of Bone- oye Falls, New York, was killed by his aeroplane. Mr. Jobes ac- companied by his pilot Mr. Robt. Berthe, of Montreal and Mr. Earl Staufferecher of Ackley, Iowa, mechanic, went to his landing field, just back of the Rosemary School about four o'clock and prepared for a flight.

Mr. Berthe was seated in the machine when Mr. Staufferecher attempted to crank it, the motor fired sooner than expected, the propeller striking him on the knee with a severe blow, which knocked him down. Mr. Jobes seeing the accident rushed to his friend's assistance and in his eagerness to reach him, forgot or misjudged the range of the propeller which struck the right side of his head killing him in- stantly.

Medical aid was secured and Mr. Staufferecher was taken to the hospital where it was found that he was suffering from a contusion of the knee. It is doing fairly well and he may be able to be out in ten days. The parents of the deceased were notified of the tragic occurrence and Saturday night his father Mr. Frank M. Jobes and a friend Mr. J. F. Darrohn, arrived from Western New York. The deceased arrived in Rosemary Tuesday night and although he was here only a few days his attractive personality and genteel manner made a splendid impression upon our people.

Those who were fortunate enough to meet him instantly became his friends. He leaves a wife and young son in Boneoye Falls, N. Y. and his parents, for whom the hearts of our people go out in the most tenderest and genuine sympathy.

The funeral party left Weldon on No. 80 Sunday afternoon. A committee from the Masonic Fraternity accompanied them to Weldon.
