O. MAX GARDNER For Governor

Why Does Not Senator Overman Debate Republican Senators, Asks Brooks

Greensboro Candidate Thinks North Carolina Should Speak From Senate Floor In Rebuttal Of Republican Villification of the President and His Administration - Aspires to Lead Fight Against Radicalism of Johnson, Militarism of Wood, and Reactionary Forces of Senators Penrose and Lodge.

Aubrey L. Brooks challenges Senator Overman to meet him in five or more joint discussions in different parts of the State, so that the people may be able to judge for themselves as to which is better fitted and qualified to serve them for the next six years.

Senator Overman has declined the invitation, and declines to come to the state and make speeches.

In a recent campaign speech Mr. Brooks said:

"What North Carolina needs in my judgement is a fighting democracy. Fighting, not by

able lawyer, a strong and patriotic citizen, and above all, an upright Christian gentleman, he ought to win, and for these reasons and many others I will vote for Gardner, work for Gardner and do all I can, in an honorable way to help make him the next governor of North Carolina."

SOME OTHER LETTERS.

Mr. R. M. Gidney, farm demonstrator and agent for Cleveland county, is certainly well informed concerning the standing of Cleveland county farmers. Mr. Gidney says:

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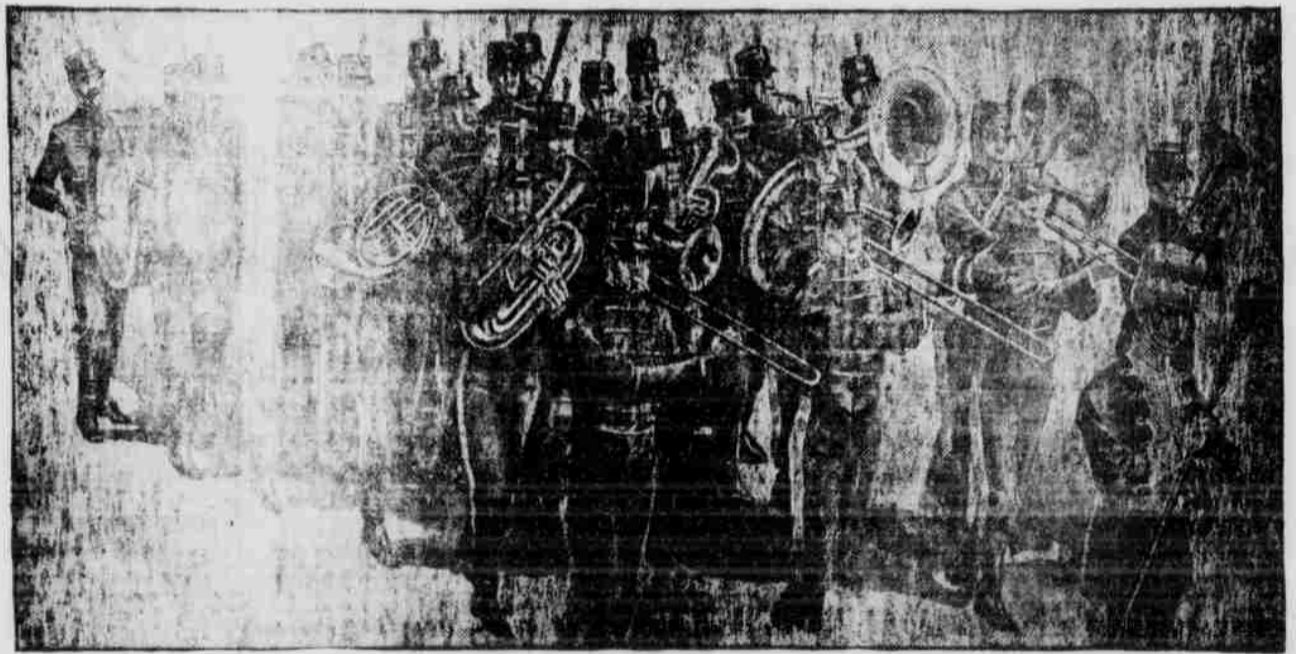
