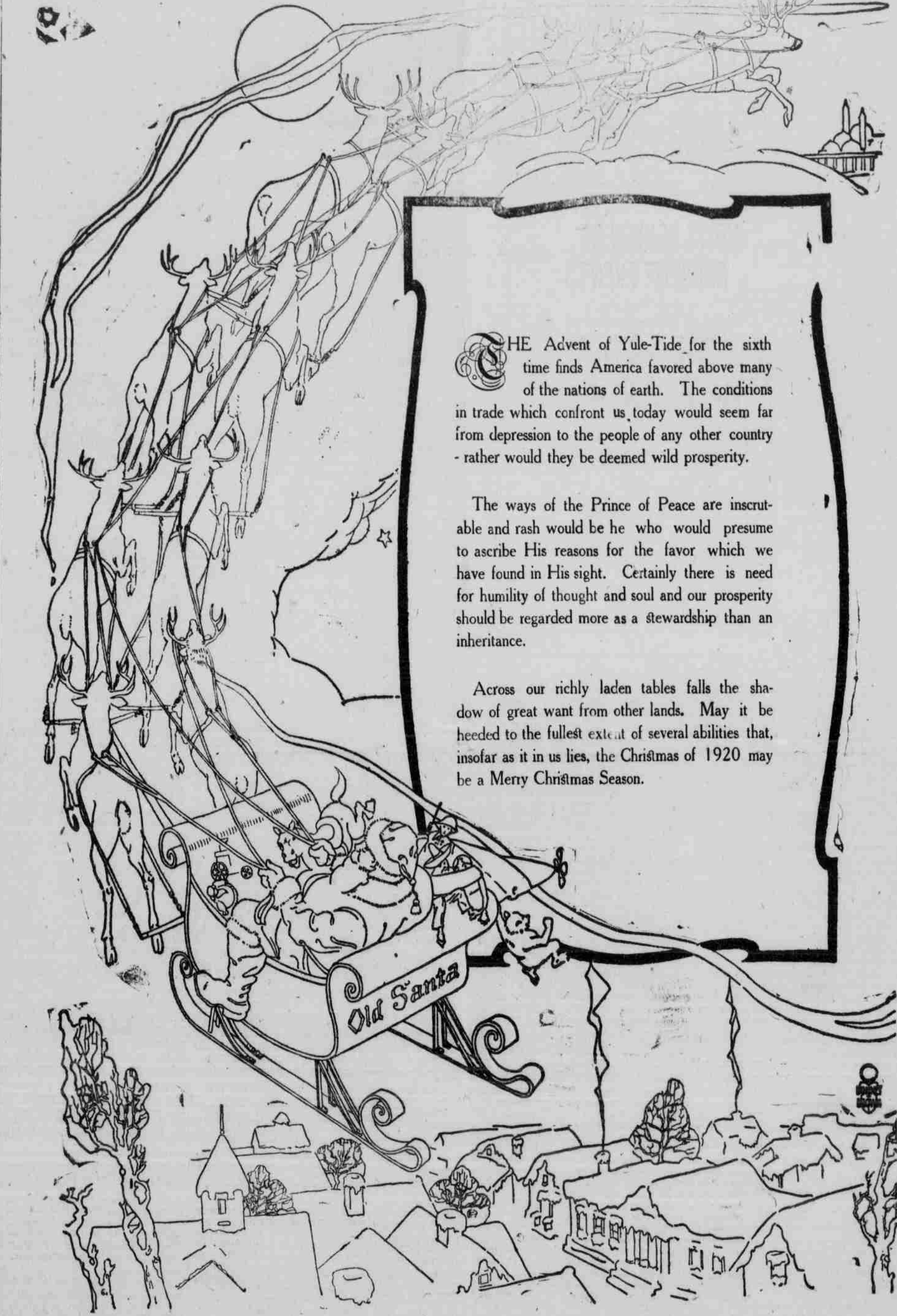

## CAPT. W. H. BRADLEY

Captain Bradley was a member of Seaboard Lodge No. 56, A. F. and A. M., and also the Scottish Rite bodies—Lodge of Perfection, Rose Croix and Auld Consistory. He was also a member of Khedive Temple, Mystic Shrine, and R. E. Lee Lodge, No. 205, Order of Railroad Conductors.

The body was removed yesterday to the residence. It will be forwarded tomorrow over the Seaboard Air Line Railroad to Thelma, N. C., where the funeral service will take place. Burial will be made in the family plot near Thelma.

## Report on Community Service Work

The director, Miss Mary Washburn, has traveled 3,231 miles and held ninety-five community meetings with an attendance of 10,019. The following schools

are visited regularly once every two weeks, Hollister, Darlington, South Rosemary, Calvary, Aurelian Springs, Hobgood, Dawsons, Halifax, Glenview, Priat and Roanoke Rapids colored schools. Every school in the county has paid for the work without aid from the state except the South Rosemary school. The largest number attending any one meeting during September was at Dawsons, during October was at Aurelian Springs, during November was at Hollister and during December was at Hobgood.

Five schools sent posters, advertising the pictures, to the state conference in Raleigh. They were Hollister, Aurelian Springs, Halifax, Dawsons, and Hobgood. The posters were made by the children. The State Department of Education was so pleased with the work that they are having a film made of them to be shown in

every county having Community Service Work. The original posters are kept in the State Office to be shown to visitors.

Possibly the most vital and far reaching phase of the work is the Junior Citizenship Department.

In Halifax County there are 134 Junior Citizens, 55 boys and 79 girls. Thrift clubs have been organized in connection with the Junior clubs. During the past three months the members have saved \$430.82. Governor Bickett will deliver certificates to the first group of Juniors early in January.

The people have taken much interest in the community singing contests held the first two weeks in December. Six types of songs were used in each school. The selection of songs was made by the people themselves. Each community deserves praise for the way they sang. Hobgood

won the twenty-five dollar prize for the best singing.

The State Board of Education is gratified to know of the beautiful spirit of cooperation that has been shown by the people of Halifax County. The teachers, children and community people at all the schools have been loyal to the director and their courtesy and kindness is appreciated by the State Department.
