Mr. Jackson, is one of the police officers in your town, and in view of this charge and his position I have made a careful investigation of the charges, and am satisfied they are not true, but on the contrary they were inspired by people in sympathy with the unlawful sale of whiskey in your community, and by hostility to Mr. Jackson, who has been unusually active in the apprehending of violators of the Prohibition Laws, and thereby made himself odious to those who desire to sell liquor in violation of law, and many who are in sympathy with the sale of liquor. My observation is that Mr. Jackson, is a fearless and faithful officer, and needs to be encouraged and commended for the services he has rendered in these matters. I would prosecute him as vigorously as I would anyone if I had the least idea he was guilty.
