ABANDON BABY IN HALIFAX YARD

Two Months Old Infant Left in Front Yard of W. F. Coppedge's Home in Halifax Last Tuesday Night

Henry Motley and his sister, Mary Motley, were placed under arrest on last Wednesday charged with abandoning Miss Motley's two months old infant, the baby, it is alleged, having been left in the front yard of Mr. W. F. Coppedge's home in Halifax on last Tuesday night.

Local officers were apprised late Tuesday night of the abandonment and that the automobile which the couple were using was on its way to Emporia and had already passed Weldon. The chase was taken up with the result that Miss Motley was arrested at the Virginia Hotel in Emporia, Wednesday morning, she in company with her sister-in-law, Mrs. Lollie Motley having taken a room there while awaiting the arrival of a train to Petersburg. When the officers reached Rosemary with Miss Motley, her brother, Henry Motley, is alleged to have confessed his part in the abandonment.

At a hearing before Magistrate Millikin in Halifax on Wednesday the defendants plead not guilty and were released. The baby was taken to the Roanoke Rapids Hospital. Miss Motley is a resident of Littleton. Her brother, Henry Motley, is an employee of the W. F. Joyner Motor Company at Rosemary and from all reports bears an excellent reputation.

CAR OVERTURNS WITH SEVEN PASSENGERS

B. Marks' Ford Enroute to Ocean View Capsized in Creek Between Emporia and Franklin Last Sunday Morning

DAUGHTER BREAKS COLLAR BONE

A very serious automobile wreck was narrowly averted on last Sunday morning when B. Marks' Ford was overturned on the road between Emporia and Franklin, Va. Seven passengers were in the car when it capsized into a creek and it is considered remarkable that the only serious injury to any of the party was that sustained by Miss Fleeta Marks whose collar bone was broken.

The car was being driven by Seabrook Jones and was enroute to Ocean View with Mrs. Marks, nurse and baby, Misses Fannie and Fleeta and Sammie Marks. The accident was caused by the bearings of a front wheel locking. The car ran down an embankment and turned over on its side into the water. It was righted by the efforts of Messrs. J. R. Myrick, B. Marks, L. C. Witherspoon, R. L. Cooper and I. L. Parker who were accompanying them in Mr. J. R. Myrick's car.

Miss Fleeta was taken immediately to the Roanoke Rapids Hospital and latest reports are that she is doing nicely.

NO BIDS FOR BONDS ROAD

The Board of Commissioners of Halifax County met last Tuesday to consider bids for \$250,000 of Road Bonds, but found that none had been submitted for consideration. The bonds were 6 per cent Road Bonds and the fact that there were no bidders is indicative of the tense financial condition of the country at this time.

The proceeds of the bonds were to have been used to construct the proposed hard surface road from here to Weldon and other highway projects. Just what steps the Board of County Commissioners will now take is not known, if in fact, any decision at all has been reached.

J. H. OLSEN CHARGED TRANSPORTING LIQUOR

Bound Over to Halifax Superior Court on Testimony W. F. Joyner. Jesse Marks Charged with Cutting W. L. Liles Also Bound Over to Court.

J. H. Olsen, of Littleton, charged with transporting liquor for sale, was placed under a two hundred and fifty dollar bond, by Recorder A. L. Clark on last Thursday to insure his appearance at the August term of Halifax County Superior Court. W. F. Joyner was the principal witness against Olsen, testifying that some time ago Olsen had brought two gallons of whiskey to the Studebaker Service Station in Rosemary and asked Mr. Joyner if he wanted it. Upon being told that he did not want it, Mr. Joyner stated that Olsen left the whiskey in the garage and Mr. Joyner later carried it to Littleton and returned it to Olsen.

The Recorder found probable cause, but the small amount of bond required probably indicates some doubt in the mind of His Honor as to the strength of the State's case.

Olsen will be remembered here as having sold barbecue in a tent at Rosemary on Saturdays for several months.

The State against Jesse Marks charged with cutting W. L. Liles on June 12 was tried before Magistrate W. S. Hancock on last Thursday. The evidence disclosed a mixture of liquor, wrestling and cutting and Marks was bound over under a hundred and fifty dollar bond to the August term of Superior Court. The affray occurred near Thelma.

TYPHOID NO RESPECTOR OF AGE

Interesting statistics with regard to the age groups affected by typhoid fever have just been compiled by the State Board of Health. There has been a general belief prevalent that only people of the so-called middle age are susceptible to this disease. The death certificates on file with the State Board of Health show such an idea to be erroneous.

During the first four years of official death registration in this state typhoid fever is given on death certificates as the cause of death of 200 people above fifty years of age, and of 282 infants who were under five years old. During that period five persons above eighty-five years and 28 under one year of age were victims of this preventable disease. These statistics show that typhoid is no more a respecter of age than it is of sex or color; that the infant in the cradle and the old person approaching dotage are susceptible even as are those in the full course of adult strength.

Because age is no bar to the disease the State Board of Health is urging that the typhoid vaccine be taken by all, male and female, white and black, children and aged. Three treatments of the anti-typhoid vaccine means immunity for two or three years from death by this cause.

SCHOOL BOARD PLACES LARGE SEATING CONTRACT

The Board of School Trustees on last Monday awarded contracts for two thousand opera chairs and six hundred desks for the new Junior Senior High School building, the American Seating Company being the successful bidder.

The chairs for the Auditorium of the new High School will be like those installed in the Peoples Theatre.
