Foreign corpor- State Seed Law requires that every package of seed weighing ten pounds or more sold to the farmers of North Carolina for seeding purposes shall have attached to it a tag showing the per cent of germination, the per cent of purity, the date germination was made, and where the seed were grown. The majority of the seed dealers in the state have expressed a willingness to comply strictly with this law in so far as it shall be possible to do so. Some few, however, have decided that the farmer is not entitled to this information and have expressed an unwillingness to comply with the law. We are, therefore, urging the farmers of the state to refuse to accept from any seed dealer in North Carolina or from any seed dealer outside the State, any package of seed weighing ten ponnds or more that does not have a tag attached to it showing the analysis of the seed. It costs the dealer practically nothing to place this tag on the package, and the farmer is certainly entitled to know whether the seed he is purchasing is likely to come up and produce a crop, and we are sure that every honest and conscientious seedsmen will be only too willing to furnish this tag to each purchaser of ten
