NEGRO SHOT AND INSTANTLY KILLED

Walter Ward, a well known colored farmer, was shot and instantly killed near his home three miles of Enfield at about ten-thirty Monday night, and Robert Bell, a son-in-law of Ward's, is being held charged with the crime. Ward was at a store a short distance from his house talking with a party of other colored men when he was shot at close range with a shot gun. The shot was fired through a window in the side of the building. The authorities were immediately notified and Bell was arrested. Coroner Rowe, held the inquest Tuesday morning and evidence sufficient to hold Bell was brought out at the hearing and he was committed to jail without bail to await the next term of Halifax Criminal Court which convenes Monday, August 15th.—Enfield Progress.

TRAFFIC REGULATIONS CAUSE MOST ARRESTS

Local Officers Watching Motorists for Infractions of Traffic Rules. L. M. Strickland Faces Halifax Jury for Alleged Wife Beating.

ALL "HOME MADE" WINE NOT LEGAL

The weekly log of Recorder Clark's court reveals cases the majority of which involved only minor infractions of the law. The local officers seem to have turned their attention again to violations of traffic ordinances, nine offenders in this particular making donations of from one to ten dollars under the Recorder's instructions during the week.

L. M. Strickland, tried for beating his wife on Thursday night plead not guilty and was corroborated by the testimony of his wife. Policeman Bishop who was summoned to the house by neighbors upon the request of one of Mr. Strickland's children, and upon his arrival found Mrs. Strickland bleeding from the mouth and with torn and disheveled clothing. The arrest took place about eleven-thirty at night and the neighborhood had been aroused along the whole block on which the Strickland menage is located. "Tell it to the Judge" said the Recorder, and as Strickland couldn't provide a hundred dollar bond, he went to Halifax jail to await the August term of court.

L. L. Barnes, a son-in-law of Strickland, was tried for driving an automobile while under the influence of liquor. The evidence not being sufficient to convict under this charge, he was fined ten dollars and costs for reckless driving.

D. H. Pope and W. F. Hux, each charged with having failed to report a contagious disease as required by law were discharged upon payment of costs.

David Perry, colored, carrying concealed weapons, was sent on to Halifax jail in default of a one hundred and fifty dollar bond.
