N. Brown Thomason sexton of the First Baptist Church, for the past thirty years, whose funeral was held Tuesday in the Baptist church, will live on in the fond memories of the Baptist members.

He loved and tenderly cared for the church. The church was always clean and with everything in its place. Mrs. W. C. Allsbrook reports that Mr. Thomason was always there for every dinner the women had and was ready to find anything they needed. He took pride in his work. Mrs. Allsbrook said he often came in her Sunday School class to see if the room was warm or comfortable in

every way. There was never a meeting held at the church, but he was there, usually sitting in front, greeting each church goer and inquiring about members of their family.

The children all loved him. Miss Mary Francis Allsbrook, daughter of Senator and Mrs. Julian Allsbrook says he never passed her, if it was a dozen times a day, that he did not smile and speak to her.

The following is an excerpt from "The Woman's Press" which will be of interest to the women.

"On January 10th, Judge Dorothy Kenyon, American delegate

to the U. N. Commission on Status of Women, introduced a resolution in the commission asking member nations to grant wider political responsibility to women.

Judge Kenyon believes that 'My county is in a most distressing state' and quotes the following figures to prove her case.

'There are no women cabinet officers, no women governors of states, no women United States senators, and no women serving in the highest state courts.

In the House of Representatives, only seven out of 435 states, nine have women legislators; nine others have but one apiece, and the total number of state legislators who are women is 211, only seven in state senates.

At the same time, it is estimated that women own seventy percent of the total wealth of the United States; control forty-seven percent of corporate stock; inherit eighty percent of life insurance; own sixty-five per cent of savings accounts; and have achieved recognition in almost all of the 534 occupations listed in the Census Bureau.

'One might write a book on this subject, but we will restrain ourselves. A few comments are however, in order.' There are 6,000,000 more women than men in the adult voting population in the United States.

Somewhat whimsically one would like to remind the Marxists that these figures run contrary to their theory that economic power carries with it, always and inevitably, political control over a nation's destiny.

Of course some women do vote as do their husbands or brothers. We cannot but regret that, up to the present, we have no accurate means of judging our wisdom and potential power."

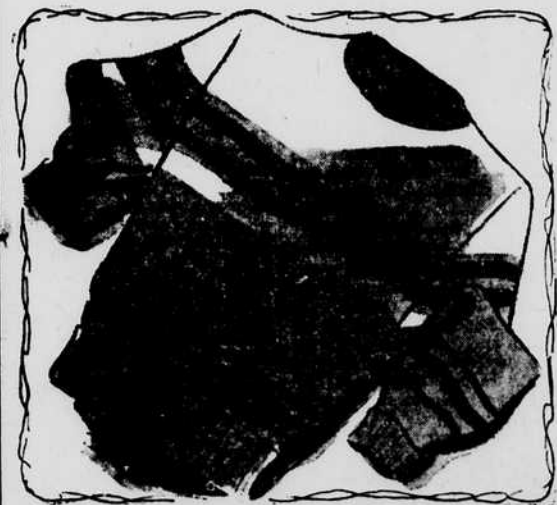

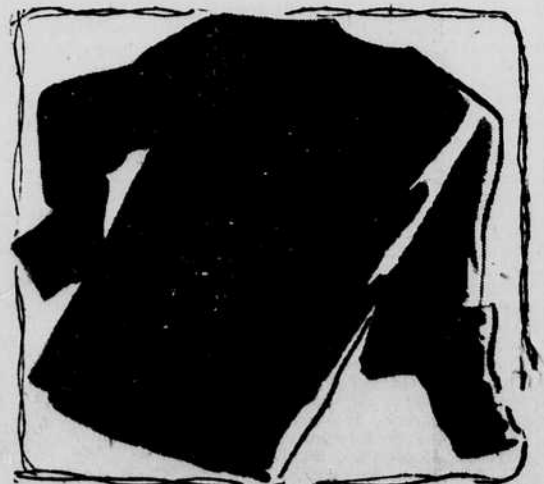
