

Galusha A. Grow entered congress in 1851, retired in 1863, re-entered it in 1894, and at the rare age of eighty, still young in heart and possessed of remarkable mental and physical vigor, he will retire from congress on the 4th day of next March, having entered public life fifty-two years ago. Grow, although a bachelor, is the happy father of that wholesome child. He conceived the bill. He introduced it into congress. He fought its battles for ten years on the floor of the house. He signed the bill as speaker of the Thirty-seventh congress, and by the signature of Abraham Lincoln it became a law. Nearly 90,000,000 acres of public domain have been permanently occupied under the homestead law, making about 670,000 entries, and the beneficiaries number over 7,000,000.
