A Picturesque Effect.

A picturesque feature in a house is to have a sitting room on a different level from the hall. In a beautiful country house on the lake shore the drawing room is two feet lower than the long, low raftered hall, making the ceiling just so much higher. As one stands on the threshold at the open folding doors before descending the couple of broad steps that lead into the room the effect is charming, especially as the room is treated in a way to enhance the impression of sudden brightness and freshness.

An Air Pump Sweeper.

A broomless housewife has become a possibility. A Yankee has invented a machine which sweeps and dusts a room by suction from an air pump in the basement. All that is necessary is to pass a hose nozzle over the carpets and furniture. The suction through it carries the dust particles to the cellar, none of them being thrown into the air of the apartment.

Degerming Corn.

The degerming of corn-that is, removing the yellow germ from the tip of each kernel—is necessary in all corn for export, because the germs when corn is in the hold of a vessel start a fermentation which spoils the whole cargo. The product each year of this degerming is about 5,000,000 gallons of corn oil, which has heretofore been used to adulterate linseed oil, but now a process for clarifying it and removing its peculiar odor brings it into competition with olive and cottonseed oil.

A Vegetable Bin.

In making a novel vegetable bin boards were nailed crosswise to three rafters below the kitchen floor and then end pieces nailed to these, thus forming a box, with a rafter passing through the center, serving as a partition. The flooring just above this box was carefully taken up and made into a trapdoor, making the bin easily accessible to the housewife. Potatoes were kept in one compartment and other vegetables in the other in small baskets.
