LARGE NUMBER GET ROAD SENTENCES

Criminal Court Adjourned Sent To Roads — Roseman Phillips Acquitted — Many Other Cases Settled.

Following is a brief synopsis of the proceedings of criminal court since our last issue. Many people have been attending. About 17 men were sent to the roads.
