EIGHTY-FOUR DAIRY COWS

Eighty-four Jersey cows valued at about seven thousand dollars have been shipped into this county under the direction of County Farm Agent Tilson and the Agricultural Department of the State.

This means that there will be about ten thousand dollars worth of butter fat shipped out of this county within the next twelve months and that is just a beginning of what will be done within the next two or three years.

Many farmers are starting flocks of hens and preparing to raise a number of hogs. These chickens and hogs will be fed principally with the skimmed milk.
