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DRYSON CITY MAN KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Bryson City, Oct. 16.—Thomas Woodard, 53, well-known lumber dealer of Bryson City, who maintained office at Asheville and other Western North Carolina cities, was killed shortly afternoon today when the automobile in which he was riding ran down an embankment from a narrow road just outside of Forney Creek.

Herbert Woodard, a nephew, who was in the automobile when it sought to pass another car driven by G. C. Proctor, was seriously injured in the accident and was rushed to Bryson City hospital, where he is undergoing treatment. Another nephew, Jefferson Woodard, was slightly hurt.

The body of Thomas Woodard was taken to his home in Bryson City. Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

The victim of the accident was a son of the late Rev. J. F. Woodard of Bryson City. He is survived by his widow and four sons, John, Denny, Glenn and Thomas Woodard, Jr. He leaves also two daughters, Jewel and Buell, twins; his mother, Mrs. J. F. Woodard, two brothers, L. B. and William Woodard, of Swain county, and two sisters, Mrs. McDabgy, of Almond, and Mrs. J. M. Smiley, of Bryson City.
