The Liquor Bill

If our legislators are willing to ignore the 185,000 majority cast against liquor by the people of N. C. just 15 months ago and desire to give the liquor interests "another bite at the cherry," then I want to say that we drys would welcome the referendum, and in that referendum we will make the majority 250,000! I have no idea that the voters will ever authorize our state government to become the agent of the distillers in Kentucky and Ohio, to sell their liquor for them to our people.

I want to make this further observation: If the legislature concludes to compel the people of this state to vote again on the liquor question, at a cost of fifty to a hundred thousand dollars for holding the election, then I think it nothing but fair that this legislature should give the people of the state an opportunity to say, not only whether liquor shall come into North Carolina and be sold legally, but also whether beer shall stay in North Carolina and be legally sold. Beer was put upon the people by the 1933 legislature without their consent; and while we are voting, I think it nothing but fair that we should have a right to pass upon this beer issue, and let us drive it out of the state also. Everybody who has exercised the slightest perception during the past year and a half knows that drunken driving and drunkenness generally have materially increased in this state since beer was legalized. Maybe this explains the drunken, besotted condition in Charlotte, so

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widely advertised by Mr. Lassiter. We want a chance to rid this state of the dirty holes and filling stations where beer is sold to our boys and girls on week-days and Sundays. By all means let's have a referendum on beer also.

It is admitted by all that bootlegging is bad, because the bootlegger sells liquor, and I, for one, am not willing to authorize my state to become the chief bootlegger in N. C., for the sole purpose of collecting a little "revenue" from rags and poverty and misery and broken homes.—Robert H. Cooke, in Charlotte Observer.

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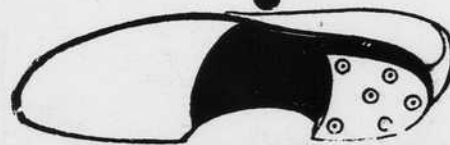
