Here is the way the Leavenworth (Kansas,) Daily Argus, published by J. P. Hamilton, late of this county gives up the ghost. The Argus says :

"About four months ago, we took possession of this paper. It was then in the very act of pegging out, and we breathed in it four months more life than it otherwise would have had, had we not taken, possesour surplus cash, and every dollar of our friends that we could get, but as everybody will see, it is no go.
